I give unto my daughter Ann my best bed & Furniture.
I give unto my son William my second best bed and Furniture. I give
unto him all my Cattle and Cows Tools Whims give my son William
Twenty Dollars Cash. I give unto my wife my third best bed and Furniture.
I give unto my wife my best Coat and one Cow and half Sack given her
my best Tule. I give my Mother Ann Phelps a Double Loin. Also
I give..... my Mother my wearing hatt. It is my will and desire that my
Sons should call help and two Sons work for the benefit of my wife &
Children until they come to age that if my son be at aged Nineteen &
my Daughter at Eighteen at which time I desire they may receive their
Estates and the Negroes to be Equally divided between them And all

Legs March called boys and two daughters work for the benefit of my wife & children until they arrive to age that is my son to be at age of nineteen & my daughter at eighteen at which time I desire they may receive their Estates and the Negroes to be Equally divided between them. And all the Remainder of my Estate I give to be divided between my wife and two children. It is my will and desire that my Mother have the Care of my Daughter and her part of the Estate until she comes to the age of nineteen. It is further my will & desire that if she that is now my wife should die before my death that my Son have the Care of my Son and his Estate. Finally and Lastly I nominate and appoint my Loving wife Samuel Bently and George Davis Executors of this my last will and Testament Respecting all other wills made by me herebefore in Testimony whereof I have set my hand & seal this 16th day of May 1758.
