Item I Give to my Loving friend Thomas Nash one Tenth and a half of St. Paul
hollen and one Tenth of St. Paul.

Item I Give to Thomas Nash Junior the first Coll that my Black Man George
will take he deliver do to him at One Year old.

Item I Give M^{rs} John Nash one half and a quarter.

And as for all the remaining part of my Estate I leave to the use of my
Loving Wife as long as she lives and after her Decease to be Equally
Divided between my two Daughters Elizabeth and John Duno and I make my
Loving Wife Kelley Executor of this my Last Will making void all
other Wills before made In Witness whereof I have set my hand and
Seal this twentieth first Day of April 1719.
