I also will and bequeath my plantation in Powhatan Co. near Peterville Church, unto my wife to be hers for ever.

I also will all my household & kitchen furniture to my wife, this includes an organ

I will and bequeath my library & manuscript sermons to my nephew Wm C Tyree and will in case I die before he finishes his Collegiate and Theological course that my wife pay him annually one hundred dollars until he finishes the above named courses of study

I will & give my gold watch to my nephew Luke Tyree of Amherst Co

All debts that may be due me whether pastoral dues or otherwise I bequeath to my wife

I, Cornelius Tyree, being of sound mind and disposing memory, do on this 23rd day of December 1891 add the following additional codicil to the will heretofore

made by me.

Having the fullest confidence in my dear wife I leave all my property of every kind to her and direct that my will and the codicils thereto stand in full force and effect notwithstanding the birth of any child born to me after my death, that such child shall take no part of my estate but shall be provided for in like manner by my dear wife as our dear child Cornelius will be provided for—

A writing, purporting to be the last Will and Testament of Cornelius Tyree, deceased, bearing date on the 5th day of May, 1880, with three codicils annexed thereto, dated respectively January 22, 1889, November 5, 1889, and July 23, 1891, was produced in court by Mrs. T. Nannie Tyree, the Executrix therein named, and thereupon W. C. Whitescarver was sworn and deposed that he is well acquainted with the testator's hand-writing, and verily believes the said writing and codicils and the name of the testator, subscribed to said writing and codicils, to be wholly written by the testator's own hand. Nannie Tyree, the executrix in said Will named, who made oath thereto, no security being required, according to a provision in said Will, entered into and acknowledged a bond in the penalty of \$4,000.00, conditioned as the law directs, certificate is granted her for obtaining a probate of said Will in due form.
