

H. Hunt to them and their heirs forever, all the residue of my estate both real and personal to be equally divided amongst them. Their names are as follows. Mary Ann Elizabeth now married to George A. Mitchell, Sarah Jane now married to Isaac Randy, Joseph Henry, Emma Gay, John Alexander, and Nancy Jackson. The division of my estate is to be made as soon after my decease as may be practicable, and each of said Grand children as may be of age or married are to take possession of their share of my estate as soon as the division is made. The shares of such of them as may be under age or unmarried are to be held and managed for their benefit by my Executor untill they respectively arrive of age or marry. Should any of my said Grand children die unmarried and without issue the share of such one is to descend and pass to the surviving brothers & sisters.

Item 3. I appoint my friend Lewis W. Richardson the Executor of this my last Will and Testament.

David Owens. Know all men by these presents that I, David Owens of Roanoke County, Virginia, being of sound mind and of disposing memory, but aged and infirm of body and aware of the uncertainty of life, do make this my last will and testament, revoking all others hitherto executed by me.

Item. I direct that out of my estate all my just debts and my funeral expenses be first paid and also my specific legacies.

Item. I devise to my son Alexander Owens my tract of land situated on Roanoke River in said County, about seven miles west of the town of Salem, and commonly known as my "Home place", also a parcel of land situated on the said River opposite to the Home place, and containing nine acres more or less, including a noted spring; but I hereby attach to the said devise

the following condition, to wit; that my said son, Alexander shall furnish to my wife Rachel Owens, comfortable support, during her natural life, including shelter, food, recreation, and necessary attendance in sickness and in health, at his own expense, and that there be a lien on the said land heretofore devised to him, to secure to my said wife the aforesaid comfortable support.

Item; I devise to my son John H. Owens, my tract of land situated in the said County on the South side of Roanoke River about one mile from the River, on Dry Hollow, containing forty eight acres, more or less, of land; also fifty acres of my tract of land, known as my Mountain plantation, being the fifty acres on the West side of the said Mountain plantation, and market part thereof to the said forty eight acres to, and adjoining the Rich Hollow tract.

Item; I also devise to my son Alexander ten acres of the said Mountain plantation for timber to keep up the land heretofore devised to him, the said ten acres to be cut off in a body on the North side, or corner of the said plantation, subject to the condition aforesaid attached to the land before devised to him.

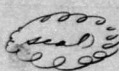
Item; It is my will that, in the event my said son Alexander shall die leaving no legitimate children living at the time of his death, or legitimate grand children living at the time of his death, then the lands heretofore devised to him shall revert to my heirs at law.

Item; Having heretofore made advancements to my other children, I now bequeath one dollar to each of the children of my son William Owens; deceased; one dollar to my son Barney Owens; one dollar to my son Henry Owens; one dollar to my daughter Jane Reitter; one dollar to my daughter Louisa Dulaney; one dollar to my daughter Emeline Hall; one dollar to my grand-daughter Willis Crush; one dollar to my grand-son James Owens, son of David Owens deceased; and one dollar to my daughter Margaret's husband, Christopher Kingo, she being dead.

Item; I bequeath to my son Alexander all the farming utensils which may be on the Home place at my decease.

Item; I hereby appoint my sons Alexander and John H. Owens the executors of this my last will and testament.

Item; I hereby bequeath to my said daughters Emeline Hall and Louisa Dulaney and my grand-daughter Willis Crush all of my household property, and other personal effects, and if any of them be dead at my decease, then the survivor or survivors to have the same. of Virginia, being of sound and disposing mind and
memory, but of feeble health, do make this my last will
and Testament. I give and bequeath to my wife, Eliza Jane,
the whole of my real and personal estate to have and to
hold for the benefit of herself and my children as long
as she may remain my widow, and at her decease to be
equally divided among my children. But in case she
should marry again, then I desire that she shall
have her one third according to law and the children
