

Executor and the money to be expended for their benefit or if in the opinion of my said Executor if at any time the said land can be sold to good advantage for their interest, he is authorized to make sale of said land and the proceeds to be put at interest for their benefit until they are of lawfull age.

3^d I direct that my Executor keep in good repair my mill property on Cataula, out of any proceeds that may be in his hands, and that the proceeds or profits arising from said mill after paying expenses be for the support of my wife, and if said Executor thinks it best for the interest of my wife to do so, he is authorized to employ a miller to take charge of, and run said mill, said mill property and all the land attached to be for the benefit of my wife during her natural life, then to be sold by my Executor for the benefit of my children, & equally divided between them.

And I hereby appoint Capt. W. W. Grand my sole Executor to carry out the above provisions of this my last will and testament given under my hand and seal this 10th day of April 1891
