

Jacob Peringer: I Jacob Peringer of the County of Roanoke and State of Virginia being of sound and disposing mind and memory and wishing to dispose of such worldly estate as under providence I am permitted to possess do make and ordain this my last Will and Testament in manner and form as follows

First, it is my will that my Executor hereinafter named shall pay all my just debts and funeral expenses out of the first money that may come into his hands

2nd I will to my beloved wife Mary F. Peringer my home tract of land containing about two hundred and seventy acres so long as she may live after her death to be sold by my Executor on one two and three years time from day of sale and convey the title when paid for, I also want my Executor to sell all other lands that I may have at my death and convey title and pay the money to my wife to have in her own right and use as she may please

3rd I will and bequeath to Jefferson D. Steel nephew to my wife one thousand dollars and to Charlotte Howburt wife of G. W. Howburt five hundred dollars to be paid out of the money received for the land sold after the death of my wife the remainder of the money for the land sold after the death of my wife I will and bequeath to the Trustees of Roanoke College and their successors to be managed for the benefit of the College as they may think best.

4th I appoint and constitute James E. Day my Executor to carry out the provisions of this will and request him not to have any appraisement of the personal property as it all belongs to my wife and make no sale unless by her request of any personal property

Provided Jefferson D. Steel would die before the death of my wife his Legacy shall revert back to my estate.
