

James Campbell. I, James Campbell, of the County of Roanoke, and State of Virginia, considering the uncertainty of his life and being of sound mind and memory, but in failing health, do make this my last Will and Testament, in manner and form as following:

First. I want my house and lot, household and kitchen furniture sold on the first day of January 1874, or as soon thereafter as possible for cash, or on time of my Executor's death; out of said sales he will pay all of my just debts and the balance, after paying to my daughter Lucy Jefferson five dollars, will be equally divided between my sister Harriet Henderson, Roger M. Bean & Bostic Jones.

2<sup>d</sup>. My beloved sister Harriet Henderson is entitled to one (amount unknown) but can be ascertained by papers in the Clerk's Office of this County, which let she will be allowed two years from time to pay the same, without interest from this date, but at the expiration of which time if not paid, my Executor will enforce a deed of trust, to be found in the office of this County, when this amount is collected. I want it divided equally between my sister Harriet Henderson, B. M. Bean & Bostic Jones.

3<sup>d</sup>. I leave Dr. James W. G. Hunt my Executor without security. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 18<sup>th</sup> day of June 1874.

Elizabeth Evans. Know all Men by these Presents that I Elizabeth Evans of the County of Roanoke and State of Virginia, being of sound and disposing mind and memory, do make and publish this my last will and testament, hereby revoking all former wills by me at any time heretofore made.

And as to my worldly estate, and all the property, real, personal, or mixed, of which I shall die seized and possessed, or

to which I shall be entitled at the time of my decease, I devise, bequeath, and dispose thereof in the manner following, to wit:

My will is, that all my just debts and funeral expenses shall, by my executor hereinafter named be paid out of my estate, as soon after my decease as shall be found convenient,

I devise and bequeath to George Painter and my beloved daughter Catherine and his wife their heirs, executors, and administrators forever all my real and personal estate, and all the profits that have accrued from the Mill and Farm during the time the said George Painter has lived upon the place, and all the debts due the estate, except the legacies hereinafter mentioned.

I devise and bequeath to my nephew Giles S. Thomas as trustee for my beloved daughter Mary T. Carter, Eight Hundred Dollars as a legacy to be paid by my executor out of my estate for her sole and separate use and benefit, and the benefit of her children, one half portion of said legacy to be paid in one year after my death, the other half portion in two years after my death. I also devise and bequeath to my said nephew Giles S. Thomas as trustee for my beloved daughter the said Mary T. Carter, one bed and bedding for the said bed, one set of sheets, and one Table, for her sole and separate use and benefit, and the benefit of her children. Caswell C. Carter, husband of the said Mary T. Carter, is not to have any portion of said legacies but they are for her sole and separate use and benefit and the benefit of her children.

And lastly I do nominate and appoint the said George Painter to be the executor of this my last will and testament.

In testimony whereof, I the said Elizabeth Evans have to this my last will and testament subscribed my name and affixed my seal this Fourteenth day of December in the year of our Lord One Thousand Eight Hundred and Sixty seven.
