

James M. Parker. In the name of God, Amen, I James M. Parker of Roanoke, Roanoke County, do make this my last will and testament, as follows [that is to say]! My desire is to be buried with as little expense as decency will permit, and that all my debts and funeral expenses be paid as soon after my decease as conveniently may be. And I give all my real estate and personal property consisting of one house and lot situated in the town of Tunton my present residence, on Lee Street, said lot being lot # 2 in block 9 of the Vinegar survey, and all my household goods and furniture, china ware, books, household linen and all the household utensils in my house, unto my dear wife, Ida E. J. Parker during the time she remains my widow. And when the said Ida E. J. Parker, my wife shall marry or die then all of my aforesaid property shall be equally divided among my children and grandchildren or their heirs, viz: Mary W. Swain, Edmund Dorn, Kate M. Parker, Edward W. Parker, Lillian Parker, Alice A. Parker, Lenora E. Parker, Lucie C. Parker, and my granddaughter Alberta Carnes, and my grandchildren Georgia and Harry Stoffler except that the last two named grand children, that is to say Georgia and Harry Stoffler shall each be given half as much of my property as each of my before named children and grandchild Alberta Carnes shall receive. And I nominate and appoint my said wife, executrix of this my last will and testament on the qualification of whom as executrix of this my last will and testament on the qualification of whom as executrix of this my will, I request and direct that no security be required for witness whereof, I, the said testator James M. Parker have hereunto set my hand and seal on the 16th day of November 1897.
