Grissom fourteen hundred dollars, to James M. Grissom fourteen hundred dollars, to Daniel H. Grissom fourteen hundred dollars, to Jane Henry fourteen hundred dollars.

Should my estate not be sufficient to pay all aforesaid above legacies in full, then the deficiency, if any, to be deducted proportionately from each share.

Fourth- I give devise and bequeath unto my esteemed Son in law John P. Henry, (in grateful recognition of his services to me), all the residue and remainder of my property, real and personal, with the exception, of my household goods, which are to be equally divided among my children.

Fifth- I appoint my son James M. Grissell, and John P. Henry, executors of this my will and desire that no security be required of them as such.
