land not previously deeded to my children and supposed to contain
about 45 acres, to hold her life time, after which said land shall be

and Elisha J. Harris, upon the following conditions. That after they shall
have been in possession of said land four years, they said B. A. Harris
& E. J. Harris, shall pay to William M. Harris, George G. Harris, and Leslie C.
