Joseph Dyerle. In the name of God Amen! I Joseph Dyerle of the County of Roanoke, State of Virginia being of sound mind and disposing memory do make and declare this to be my last Will and Testament

After the payment of all my just debts and funeral expenses, should my much loved wife A. survive me I will and bequeath to her during the term of her natural life, in lieu of her dower interest in my estate should she be willing to accept this provision, all that portion of my land lying North of Roanoke River, East of the following line - beginning at the mouth of ^{the} "Mount Hope Branch" running along said Branch to the "Mount Hope Spring" then in a Westernly direction along a rock fence to near the top of the hill then South some 8 or 10 poles, then in a Westernly direction to Callahan's line, leaving between the said line and the upper part of "Mount Hope Branch" some 20 or 25 acres, thence with Callahan's line to the McAdamized road, including the Swelling House and all buildings of every description situated on said land. It is further my will that at my wife's death the land herein devised to her shall descend to my daughter Martha L. Dyerle should she be then living, if not or should she die without issue then I direct the said tract of land to be divided among my other heirs except as hereinafter directed.

To my son S. Lewis Dyerle I leave the care of his mother and sister Martha, so long as the latter may remain unmarried. And I will and bequeath to him one hundred and sixty acres of land situated on that portion of my farm known as the "Mount Hope Place" lying immediately West of and adjoining the land herein before devised to his mother.

I leave to my loved wife to do with as she wills to dispose of either by gift will or otherwise all the household and kitchen furniture of all descriptions I may die possessed of with all my pump garden tools axes &c. My carriage and any four horses she may choose from the number I may die possessed of & also to be selected from the stock on hand at my death and such other farming utensils as she may deem necessary to properly farm the land herein devised to her, seven cows one bull 12 head of hogs to be selected by herself, and as much provision for herself and household, and provender for her stock as she may deem sufficient to last her for twelve months from the date of my death.

I give and bequeath to my daughter Susan G. the wife of Charles J. Barnett, and the heirs of her body all my interest in the tract of land lying in Montgomery County, Va. on which they now reside, the same being the one undivided half formerly owned by Giles Barnett from whom I purchased it.

She the Susan G. Barnett to take the said tract of land at the price of \$2750.00 to be accounted for, by her in the division of my estate as so much money advanced to her

I give and bequeath to my Grand daughter Mary J. the wife of James Ward of Russell County Va. the sum of \$100.00 to be paid as hereinafter provided and it is my will that she have, no further interest in my estate either at my death or when the property hereinbefore devised to my wife and to my daughter Martha in reversion shall be divided among my other heirs as herein before provided.

All of my estate, both real and personal, not herein before disposed, I direct to be sold in such parcels and at such time as my executors hereinafter to be named shall direct, and the proceeds of such sale to be applied 1st to the payment of my just debts. 2nd to the payment of the legacy to my Grand-daughter Mary J. Ward hereinbefore mentioned ~~and then~~ and the remainder to be so divided among my children not hereinbefore provided for namely my sons James C. John Ly and Ballard P. and my daughters Eliza Ann the wife of James Thomas Susan G. the wife of Charles J. Barnett and Sarah E. the wife of Sam^l Torres that the money, I have heretofore expended for and advanced to them, an account of which will be found with my papers, shall with what they receive in this division make their respective shares equal

I hereby appoint my brothers Benjamin Dyerle and David Dyerle executors of this my last will and testament.
