2nd I bequeath to my wife all the Bedding of every Description and all the furniture that she got of her mother and all the provisions of every kind that may be on hand and the crops that may be sown or planted and to have the Land under her entire control during her life and after her Death whenever my executor may think best sell the tract of Land altogether without any Division upon such time and terms as he may think best and pay the proceeds out to my Heirs equally charging them that has received with what they have received charging my son in law George Pogue with Three hundred Dollars and Elijah Pogue with one hundred & Sixty two dollars & fifty cents All are to be made equal of my children Ellen Pogue Nancy Ellen Mary Pogue Charles Sloan Sarah Griso and the three children of Jacob Sloan's heirs Mary Catharine Tenney and James One hundred Dollars is to be retained in the hands of my Executor first of all for James Sloan Jr and he is to have the Bed that his uncle James Sloan left her when his grandmother thinks proper to give it to him And all my personal property not mentioned my executor will sell at any time he may think best leaving such as my wife may need And to carry this my last will into effect I appoint my son in law William Griso my executor And no security required Witness the following signatures and seal the 8th day of February 1876

Item 1st I direct that all my just debts be paid by my Executor herein after made.
Item 2nd After the payment of my debts as aforesaid I give and bequeath to my six grand-children the children of my deceased daughter Nancy Ann Heath first wife of Patrick

All I have to them and their heirs forever, all the residue of my estate both real and personal to be equally divided amongst them. Their names are as follows. Mary Ann Elizabeth now married to George A. Mitchell, Sarah Jane now married to Isaac Bandy, Joseph Henry, Emma Gay, John Alexander, and Nancy Jackson. The division of my estate is to be made as soon after my decease as may be practicable, and each of said Grand children as may be of age or married are to take possession of their share of my estate as soon as the division is made. The shares of such of them as may be under age or unmarried are to be held and managed for their benefit by my Executor untill they respectively arrive of age or marry. Should any of my said Grand children die unmarried and without issue the share of such one is to descend and pass to the surviving brothers & sisters.

Item 3. I appoint my friend Lewis W. Richardson the Executor of this my last Will and Testament.

David Owens. Know all men by these presents that I, David Owens of Roanoke County, Virginia, being of sound mind and of disposing memory, but aged and infirm of body and aware of the uncertainty of life, do make this my last will and testament, revoking all others hitherto executed by me.

Item. I direct that out of my estate all my just debts and my funeral expenses be first paid and also my specific legacies.

Item. I devise to my son Alexander Owens my tract of land situated on Roanoke River in said County, about seven miles west of the town of Salem, and commonly known as my "Home place", also a parcel of land situated on the said River opposite to the Home place, and containing nine acres more or less, including a noted spring; but I hereby attach to the said devise
