I, Mary Ann Reid Barnett, being, comparatively, in good health, of sane mind, and of disposing memory, do hereby make this my last will and testament.

First, my wish and desire is, that in consideration of the Love I bear my dear Husband, John Logan Barnett, I bequeath to him all my real estate, which consists of parts of 2 Lots Nos. 16 and 36, with all the appurtenances thereunto, belonging, lying, and being in the town of Salem, Roanoke Co., (Virginia), on the corner of Main and Union Streets, running with Union Street, to a corner near the Old Academy, on Street, thence East to line fence of John A. Murray, and thence South, along said line fence, to Main Street, and thence West, to the beginning. I also will and bequeath to my said Husband, all of my personal property, of every description, to have and to hold, during his life-time, (unless he prefer to carry out my will sooner,) and at his death, my desire is, that, in consideration of a debt we owe our brother, Thomas M. Barnett, he shall have an interest in the aforesaid real estate, equal to the sum of \$600.00, (six hundred dollars,) and the remainder to be equally divided among our three children, James M. Barnett, Mary B. Middleton, and Robert Logan Barnett, and the personal property, to be disposed of as followeth, to wit: Item 1st I bequeath to James M. Barnett the cherry work-table, once owned by his Mother, (Lucinda E. Barnett).

Item 2nd, I give to Mary B. Middleton The large Cherry Bureau.

Item 3; I give to my son R. L. Barnett, my silver teaspoons

and salt spoons, my Mahogany work-table with glass knobs, and the small falling-leaf table with drawer in the end. My silver table-spoons and forks to be divided among our three children.

Item 4." I give to my nephew, Robert H. Logan, the small chest known as the Sugar chest.

Item 5." I give to my nephew Robt. Logan, of Sherwood, the large split bottomed rocking chair.

Item 6." I give to my nephew J. Lewis Logan, the large, red arm chair that sits in the porch.

Item 7." I give to my niece, Margie M. Armstrong, the family walnut chest.

Item 8." I give to my nephew, Carter W. Logan, the cherry dining table that sits in my room, and the old-fashioned blue dish.

The parlor furniture, and the remainder of the personal property, to be divided equally among our three children, J. W. Barnett, Mary P. Middleton and Robt. L. Barnett.
