Oliver do make & ordain this my last Will and
Testament.

1st. I give to my great nephew Charles Wesley
Carter and his two sisters, Mrs Rebecca G. Bruce
and Miss Kate M. Carter, the tract of land upon
which I live, known as Huntingdon, lying on the
South side of Tinker Creek, adjoining lands of
David S. Read, Wm. Watt, Pepton B. Evans and
others, and being the same land which was bequeath-
ed to myself & sisters by our uncle Elisha Bettis,
except that portion which was sold by my sister Mrs.
Elizabeth Waller her husband, Thomas Waller to
William M. Peyton. This property to be held by them
in equal right & equal proportions, with the hope
that it will be a comfortable home for them all.

2nd. My land lying on the North side of Tinker
Creek, known as Rocky Dale, adjoining the land of
David S. Read, Leroy Campbell, & Mrs Fanny
Getty, containing about two hundred acre more or
less. I give to my great nephew Carter Oliver, the
son of my nephew, Isaac Oliver, deceased.

3rd. My land, lying on the South side of the
Roanoke river, in what is known as Ballyhock,
adjoining the lands of Joseph Bandy, John Edington,
and others, and containing about Eight hundred
acres, more or less. I direct to be divided as follows.
to wit: I give to my great niece Mrs Mildred H.
Hudson, the wife of Dr Robert B. Hudson. Five
hundred acres, to be laid off to her nearest to & most
convenient to the dwelling house in which she now
lives, to be held by her in her own separate right
free from the control, debt, or contracts of her husband,
with the right to dispose of the same during her life
by deed, and at her death to give it by her last
Will and Testament as she may choose.

remainder of of this land I give to my great nephew Charles Hesley Carter and his two sisters Mrs Rebecca Y. Bruce and Miss Kate M. Carter, to be held by them in equal right & equal proportions, and for the purpose of supplying timber and fuel for the Huntington place.

4th Whatever personal property I may now at my death, I direct to be divided as follow, viz: I give two thirds of it in value to the four daughters of my deceased brother Isaac Oliver, viz: Mrs Martha Eppes, Mrs Mary B. White, Mrs Anna Watkins, and Mrs Elizabeth F. Dunlap, to be equally divided between them - to be held by them in their own separate right free from the debts, contracts or control of their present or future husbands, and with the power to dispose of the same during their respective lives by deed or other contract, and by their last will or testament at their death. The remaining one third, I direct to be equally divided among my great nephews and nieces, viz: Mrs Elizabeth H. Hudson, Charles Hesley Carter, Kate M. Carter, Issa O. Carter, Carter Oliver, and Mrs Rebecca Y. Bruce. - I make this general provision as to my personal property, because there never was any division of it among my sister and myself, except my sister Elizabeth, and I do not know what portion I own of it in my own right. And I appoint Frederick Johnston & Alexander White the Executors of this my last Will, and Testament, to jointy or separately, should either of them decline the office. Witness my signature this 20th day of October A.D. 1864.

At a Circuit Court held for the County of Roanoke on the 29th day of August 1866.

The last Will and Testament of Matilda M. Oliver dec'd was this day produced in Court and proved according to law by the oath of William Watts, who proved the attestation of said Will in presence of himself and J. Ernest the other subscribing witness, and now a non-resident of Virginia, and the said Will being duly stamped, is ordered to be recorded.

And the Executors named in the said Will having appeared in Court and declined to take upon themselves the burden of the execution thereof, on the motion of Colin Bap who made oath, and together with George P. Taylor and Charles H. Carter, his securities entered into and acknowledged a Bond in the penalty of Ten Thousand Dollars, conditioned as the law directs, the said Colin Bap is appointed Administrator with the will annexed of the said Matilda M. Oliver, deceased.

note. The property of Miss Matilda M. Oliver dec'd was considerably mixed up & mingled with that of her two sisters who died before she did. We have therefore carefully and as far as we could, separated her individual & separate estate from her sisters and make the amt. appraised as above \$3606.17 and also appraised the joint Est. of Misses Sally C. Oliver, Rebecca S. Oliver, Matilda M. Oliver and annexed it hereto, by which it will be seen that the amt is \$1883.75 one third of which belongs to Miss Matilda M. Oliver which we have added to the estimate of her estate. We suppose she will also be entitled to a distributive share of her sisters' estates.
