I desire after my death to be decently buried, and all my just debts and funeral expenses to be paid out of my estate as soon as practicable after my death.

Item, I give, devise and bequeath to my beloved wife, Ellen Campbell, to be used and disposed of by her as she may desire, that portion of my lot situated and lying upon and north of the alley running from Water Street to Union Street in Salem, fronting on Water Street fifteen feet and running back from said Street between parallel lines - a distance of eighty feet. This bequest is made in consideration of my wife having built upon said lot a strip of land, a house with her own money, and in consideration that she will convey to my estate the lot of land, lying just north of and adjoining to my lot, which was conveyed to her by my brother, Samuel Matthews, I give, devise and bequeath unto my beloved wife Ellen Campbell all the balance of my real and personal estate of which I may die possessed, (exclusive of the lot of land above mentioned), for and during her natural life, and at her death, I devise my real property to my three children, Maria Harris, wife of Edgar Harris, Samuel H. Campbell, and William Lewis Campbell, as follows, to my daughter Maria Harris, that portion of my lot on which the store house stands, running back the width of said store house to the westline of my said lot and also the lot of land to be conveyed to my estate by my wife, to my sons Samuel H., and William Lewis, my dwelling house and lot left after taking off that portion devised in fee to my wife, and that portion devised to my daughter Maria Harris, to be held by them one half to each, the hall-way running from the front to rear in said dwelling house to be held by them in common.

Whatever of personal estate may be left by my wife at her death, I devise and bequeath equally to my children above named, and in the event they or any two of them can not agree upon a division in kind, then the same shall be sold and the money divided equally between them.

In the event my wife Ellen Campbell should fail to convey to my estate, the lot of land above mentioned, so that the devise of same to my daughter, Maria Harris, should fail and be of no avail to said Maria, then the devise to my wife in fee of the lot described above shall be void, and in that event I devise and bequeath the said lot upon the death of my wife, to said Maria her

heirs. &c.

I appoint my wife Ellen Campbell Executrix of this my last will and testament and pray the court in which this my will may be probated, to require no security of her, nor do I desire that any appraisement of my estate be made, and I hereby revoke any and all wills by me heretofore made.
