I, Mary Ann Reid Barnett, being, comparatively, in good health, of sane mind, and of disposing memory, do hereby make this my last will and testament.

First, my wish and desire is, that in consideration of the Love I bear my dear Husband, John Logan Barnett, I bequeath to him all my real estate, which consists of parts of 2 Lots Nos. 16 and 36, with all the appurtenances thereunto, belonging, lying, and being in the town of Salem, Brooke Co., (Virginia), on the corner of Main and Union Streets, running with Union Street, to a corner near the Old Academy, on Street, thence East to line fence of John A. Murray, and thence South, along said line fence, to Main Street, and thence West, to the beginning. I also will and bequeath to my said Husband, all of my personal property, of every description, to have and to hold, during his life-time, (unless he prefer to carry out my will sooner,) and at his death, my desire is, that, in consideration of a debt we owe our brother, Thomas M. Barnett, he shall have an interest in the aforesaid real estate, equal to the sum of \$600.00, (six hundred dollars,) and the remainder to be equally divided among our three children, James M.
