consideration of which he is to pay the other together one hundred and

Hearty person who I leave to him and his heirs forever

4th I give to my daughter Ann Bullen and her heirs the nature of Anne
and her married George by her paying up to ^{the} other legacies the price

that said George will be appraised to the value of her during her
natural life and at her decease to pay to the heirs of her own body

5th I allow my negro woman Jan and her children to make choice
to live with any of my children they please by their paying up

to the other legacies in hundred and thirty pounds ^{if} but in case so

and her children do not choose to live with any of my children

then allow them to be sold by my Executors for the best price

that can be had and their price divided among all the legacies

as hereafter directed

6th I allow my man Sam to be sold for the best price that can
be had and only because that he may have liberty to choose

her master and his price be as much as the master
I give to my grand son James Duntap Wodgo living
I follow all the balance of my Land not yet bequeathed to
my Executors and the money among my son Alexander Duntap he is to
among all my children except my son Anne Bratton and Polly
have thirty pounds more than the other legates
I give to my three daughters Betty Gay Anne Bratton and Polly
Crocket all my body clothes to be equally divided among them
all the balance of my Estate not yet bequeathed to wit! the Price
of Philb and John George Jan and her children and Ben and all the
the rest of my personal property follow to be sold unequally divided
among my six children to wit Alexander Duntap Betty Gay James
Duntap Ann Bratton John Duntap and Polly Crocket

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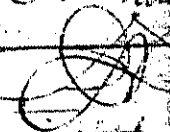
