In the Name of God Amen. I Robert Durrett of Parish
of George in the County of Lancaster being in Perfect
Health and of a sound Mind and Memory (blessed be God)
Do make and Publish this my last Will and Testament
One the 5 Day of November in the year of our Lord One
Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty Three in Manner
and form following. (that is to say) First I commit my Body
to the Earth from whence it was taken in hope of a Joyfull
Resurrection thus the alone Utterance of Jesus Christ & my soul
into the Hands of God that gave it I also give and bequeath
unto my dear son George Durrett that Tract or Parcell of Land
whereon he now lives known by by the Name of Hemps Place
and also one Negro ^{wench} named Nell, one Negro boy named Moses
One Horse now in his Possession, one Feather Bed & Furniture
One Cow and Calf I also give & bequeath unto my Nech son
Robert Durrett after my own life and my Wives that Tract
or Parcell of Land whereon I now live and also one Negro Wench
named Bess and one Negro boy named Dilly one Feather Bed
and Furniture of one Cow & Calf I also Give and bequeath
unto my daughter Elizabeth Durrett One Negro girl named
Grace one Feather Bed and Furniture one Horse and saddle
Saddle and one Cow and Calf I also Give & bequeath unto my
Daughter Leah one Negro girl named Isabell one Horse
and saddle, one Feather Bed and Furniture gone Cow & Calf.

I also give & bequeath unto my Daughter Katherine Durnett One Negro Girl Named by one Horse and Caddle, one feather Bed and Furniture of one Cow & Calf, I also leave & bequeath unto my Dear Wife Elizabeth Durnett During her Natural Life the Tract of Land whereon I now live & also the Liberty of working Two Negroes upon that Tract of Land already bequeathed to my Son George Durnett during her Natural life I leave to my beloved Wife During her Life One Negro fellow Named Daniel, One Negro fellow Named Jack, One Negro fellow Named Joe, One Negro Wench Named Chick, One Negro Wench Named Joan, One Negro Wench Named Patt, One Negro wench Named Winy, One Negro Girl Named Doll, I also send unto my Dear Wife During her Natural life all my Personal Estate which I Shall die Possessed off the above legacies already bequeathed Except, if after her Decease I leave the same to be Equally divided among my seven Children, Viz. George Durnett, Robert Durnett, Mary Ann Hoskin, Diana Chapman Elizabeth Durnett, Leah Durnett, & Katherine Durnett or their issue, in case of any of them Decease without issue to be Equally divided amongst the Survivor. I also give unto my Dear wife & to be entirely at her own Disposal one Negro girl Named Emy I also Give unto my Daughter Diana Chapman Eight Pounds Current Money of Virginia to be paid her Extraordinary at the Division of my Estate, In view of a House. It is also my will and Desire that if any of the above Negro Girls should die already bequeathed to my three Daughters at this time unmarried Viz Elizabeth, Leah & Katherine that they shall have liberty of choosing another or others out of the Estate left to my wife, I also make Appoint & Ordain George Durnett, George Chapman, and Henry Goodloe joint Executors of this my last Will, In full Power & Trust for the intents & purposes of this my Will contained, & I also make my loving Friends above named Overseers of this my last will & Testament to take care to see the same performed according to the true intent

And Meaning whereof, all other, or former Wills beforeby me
made are void of this only to remain in full force of law:

and seal the day and year first above written.

At a Court held for Spotsylvania County on Monday July the first,
1765. The last will and testament of Robert Dunnett deceased being exhibited unto Court by
George Dunnett and George Chapman two of the executors herein named George Dunnett having a law
of the said deceased he had no objection to the proving the said Will, whereupon the same
was proved by the oath of Richard Dunnett a subscriber thereto and ordered to be certified, and the
said executors took the usual oath, and gave bond with John Estes and Harry Goodloe security
for their true and faithfull execution of the said decedents Estate, and performance of his Will.

I know all Men by these Presents that we George Dunnett
George Chapman John Estes & Henry Goodloe are held and
firmly bound to Fielding Lewis Joseph Brock, John Crane &
William Smith Gentlemen Justices of Spotsylvania County
now sitting in the sum of Three Thousand Pounds Current
Money of Virginia to the Payment Whereof well and truly
to be made to the said Justices and their Successors we bind
Our selves and each of us our and each of our Heirs Es^tgadm.
Jointly & severally firmly by these Presents sealed with
our seals this first day of July in the year of our Lord 1765
and in the fifth year of the reign of our sovereign Lord King
George the Third — The condition of this Obligation
