Item I give an devise to my Son son John James Chew my Gold Watch. Chew's gold watch in token of my love and affection for him.

Item my Will & desire is that my Daughter Elizabeth may be maintained at the Expence of my Estate from and immediately after my death untilt she is Married and the sum of Two hundred Dollars per annum be paid to her to purchase such necessaries as she may stand in Need of.

Item I desire that my brother Harry may have all my Mourning Cloths if he will accept of them.

Item Whereas I amget by Deed of Record in Court of Pictou and County to the W<sup>r</sup> & Children of my brother Joseph Sunday Slaves for slaves in that said Expressd with power to revoke the same at pleasure. I do hereby give by this my Will the said Slave with their increase to the Children of my s<sup>r</sup> Brother Joseph to be Equally divided between them their heirs & Assignes forever, in the manner in the said Deed mentioned.

Item I desire that my Estate may not be ap. Crasid, and that my son Robert Chew who I appoint my Whole and Sole Executor will make an Inventory of the same and as the Debts which I owe are but trifling It is my desire that he may not be obliged to give security for his Executordship, And I do hereby declare this writing wholly written with my own hand to which I have affixed my seal to be my last Will & Testament this 14<sup>th</sup> Day of May 1805





