

December the 5th 1755 In the name of God Amen.
Jane Grigsby being sick and weak in body but of sound and perfect memory
thanks be to Almighty God for the same and first I give and bequeath my soul to Almighty
God that gave it me & my body to be decently buried by my executors whom I shall appoint
I then I give and bequeath to my son John Grigsby one of my best hogs that is in the pen
& the other three that is in the pen and three running at large I give to my son Moses
Grigsby for the maintenance of his brother Thomas Grigsby and likewise I give him all
my pewter & some cloth to make him a waistcoat & some cotton linen to make him
four shirts & white Linnen for one and likewise I give him five head of Cattle and
likewise I give him two feather beds & furniture and all my water vessels I then I give
my son Aaron Grigsby a barrel Horse branded IG and likewise I give him one
chest Whereunto I have set my hand and fixed my seal.

And likewise I give my son Moses Grigsby & her mother Jane Grigsby all my household goods not above mentioned. And likewise I appoint
my son Moses Grigsby my whole executors for this my last will and testament
William Grigsby. John Grigsby. & Mrs Grigsby.

At a Court held for Stafford County 15th April 1756

The within last will and testament of Jane Grigsby was presented into Court by John
Grigsby Executor therein named who made oath thereto according to Law and being
further proved by the oaths of John Grigsby and Anne Grigsby two of the witnesses
thereto subscribed is admitted to Record And on motion of the said Executor and by
performing what is usual in such cases Certificate is granted him for obtaining
a probate thereof in due form.
