 this my Last will and Testament in manner and form following. First I bequeath
 my soul to god my Creator and to the infinite mercies of my Redeemer my Lord and
 Saviour Jesus Christ by whose merits and Passion alone I hope for salvation through
 the divine Justice of god the father and the holy ghost. I Bequeath my body to
 the Earth to be buried in Christian manner at the discretion of my Executors hereafter
 named. I Imp. I will and desire that all my Just debts be truly and lawfully paid
 Item. I give to my son and heir William Embury and his heirs all my Land that depends
 to me in Tail by my grandfathers will. Item. I give to my son Giles Embury and his
 heirs all my Real and Personal Estate. Item. my will is that my Executors hereafter
 mentioned doe petition the assembly of Maryland to bestow the Interest of my Land called
 Kent fort manner in Maryland for the advancement of Giles Embury my younger son
 and his heirs forever. Having inclosed my Estate with Land due to do according to the
 Kent fort manner and other inclosed Land in Virginia that are not able to be sold
 for my said son otherwise. Item. I doe hereby constitute and appoint my dearly
 and well beloved friends Coll. Henry Ditzhugh and Major Alex. Merganser to be Executors
 of this my Last will and Testament and doe hereby declare and make void and
 void all former or other wills heretofore by me at any time made and Testamentary
