I give and bequeath my Soul to God that gave it me relying on the meritts of my blessed Saviour to have full Remission of all my sins and my body to the Earth to be buried at the Discretion of my Executors hereafter Named

I give & bequeath unto Robert Savidge all my housing and Land to: all Appurtenances thereunto belonging to him and his Heirs Lawfully begotten; and in case he should dye to: said Lawfull Issue; then the said Land to return to Lovells Savidge his brother and Heirs Lawfully begotten; as also one feather bed & bolste, one rug and one pair of blankets & one pair of sheals & also two feather beds to: ruggs blankets and sheals after my wives Decease; and also three Cows & Calves & one Mare bridle & saddle and all my Trooping Arms & Two Gunns & one Cast Lock & key & one Iron Pott; and after my wives Decease Two other Iron Potts; and the full half of my Stock of Cattle after my wives Decease and Three cows and one Dam and Three breeding Sows and six pewter basons and one pewter Dish

I give and bequeath unto Samuell Blackgrove one horse bridle & saddle one Gunn and sword & my will and Desire is in case my wife should dye that then the said Samuell Blackgrove shall Immediately enjoy his freedom

I give and bequeath unto my Dear and Loving wife one feather bed & furniture to: all my whole Estate excepting the above said Leggacys During her Naturall Life & my will and Desire is that Lovells Savidge shall enjoy the full half of my Stock of Cattle and one Gun and sword after my wives Decease & further my will is that after my Just Debts and Leggacys are paid and after my Wives Decease that my whole personall Estate be Equally Divided between Robert and Lovells Savidge and my will is that my Dear and loving wife shall be whole and sole Executrix of this my Last Will and Testament and further I constitute & appoint my well beloved friends Frances Began and William Davidson to have the oversight of this my last Will and Testament.
