John Newsum being sick and weak in body but of good and perfect Sense and memory God be praised doe hereby make and Ordain this my Last Will and Testament in manner and form following I bequeath my Soul to God my maker and by body to the Earth wherof it was made to be decently Buried at the discretion of my Executors hereafter appointed and for what worldly goods and Estate it hath pleased God to Indow me with I give and dispose of as followeth

- I Give and bequeath to my Son William Newsum my Land and plantation whereon I now live to him and his heirs for ever
- I Give and bequeath to my Son Joel Newsum my two Negroes Frank and Duce and twenty five pounds Current money of this Country to be paid him when he comes to the age of eighteen Years of age
- I Give and bequeath to my Loving wife Sarah my two negroes St. Jack and Betty
- I Give and bequeath the remainder part of my Estate of what nature qualitie so ever to be equally divided between my Loving wife and all my Children And my further Will and desire is that my two Sons William and Joel be of age at eighteen Years of age and receive their Estates and enjoy the benefit of them and Labor
- My further Will and desire is that my negro boy Jack should be sold by way of Outcry and that my brother William Newsum should have the Selling of him and the money to be divided equally between my wife and Children
- And I doe hereby make appoynt and Ordain my Loving wife Sarah my Sole Executrix of this my Last Will and Testament and also doe hereby desire and appoint my Loving friends William Newsum and Carter Cofford to be Overseers to see this my Will duly Executed and performed and that this is my Last Will and Testament I have hereunto set my hand and Seale this fifteenth of December 1723

This Indenture made the Twen ty Third day of June in the Year of our Lord One thousand seven hundred and Twen ty four Between George Hunt of Charles City County Gent<sup>l</sup> of the one part and John Allen of the County of Surry Gent<sup>l</sup> of the other part Witnesseth That the said George Hunt for and in Consideration of the Summ of five Shillings to him in hand paid the receipt whereof he doth hereby Acknowledge and thereof doth Acquit and discharge the said John Allen his Executors, Administrators and Assignes Health Shapounds and S<sup>ts</sup> and doth by these presents bargain and sell unto the said John Allen his Executors, Administrators and Assignes A Certain Tract or parcel of Land with the Appurtenances therof Situate lying and being on both Sides of Nottaway River in the County of Surry aforesaid containing by Estimation Two thousand Six hundred Acres of Land be the same more or less the greater part of the said Land being what was given to the said George by the last Will of his Father William Hunt and one hundred Acres purchased by the said George Hunt from Francis Mayberry and his wife daughter of Henry Wyche who formerly purchased the said hundred Acres from the said William Hunt, All which two thousand Six hundred Acres more or less were the Lands and proper Estate of the said William Hunt by virtue of two Several Patents the one dated the Twen ty fourth day of October One thousand seven hundred and One for four thousand three hundred forty two Acres the other dated the nineteenth day of December One thousand seven hundred and Eleven for one hundred and ninety Acres And also the Reversion and Reversions, Remainder and Remainders thereof and of every part and parcel thereof To have and to hold the aforesaid Lands with their Appurtenances unto the said John Allen his Executors Administrators and Assignes from the day next before the date hereof unto the end and Term of one Year from thence next ensuing to the Intent that by Virtue thereof and of the Statute for Transferring Uses into Possession the said Sr. Allen may be in the Actual Possession of the said Land And be enabled to take and Accept of a Grant and Release of the Premises to him his heirs and Assigns for ever In Witnes whereof the said George Hunt hath hereunto set his hand and Seal the Day and Year first above written
