That the said William Thompson for and in Consideration of the sum of One hundred and ten pounds Current
money in hand unto him the said William Thompson by the said William Gray at and before the Enrolling and
Delivery of these presents the receipt whereof the said William Thompson doth hereby acknowledge and thereof and
of every part thereof doth hereby also Accept and discharge the said William Gray his heirs Executors &c. both present
barquand and sold and doth by these presents Grant bargain and sell unto the said William Gray his heirs &c.
a feigns for ever Nine negro Slaves with and known by the name of Tom Shaw Frank Shaw James Tom Guy
Jureth Jorke, Harry Emey, and Hannah and all their Increase. To have and to hold these said
negro Slaves with all their Increase unto the said W^m Gray his heirs and Assigns for ever PROVIDED
always and it is Nevertheless agreed and concluded by and between the said parties to these presents and it
is the true Intent and meaning thereof That if the said William Thompson his heirs Executors Administrators
or either of them shall well and truly pay unto the aforesaid William Gray or his heirs the above mentioned
Consideration of One hundred and ten pounds Current Money with the Lawfull Interest arising thereon five
years before the first day of September next ensuing the date hereof at or in the now Dwelling house of the
said William Gray Situate in the County aforesaid that then this present Indenture and every clause and
Article therein contained shall cease determine and be of no Effect any thing in these presents contained to the
contrary thereof in any wise Notwithstanding In Witness whereof the said William Thompson hath
hereunto set his hand and affixed his Seal the day and Year above written.

The Ninth day of November in the Year of our Lord Christ One thousand seven hundred and twenty four Richard Washington of Southwark Parish in Surrey County being weak in body but in perfect mind and memory thanks be given to God therefore and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die do make and Ordain this my Last Will and Testament in manner and form following that is to say Principally and first of all I commend my soul into the hands of Almighty God that gave it and my body to the Earth to be buried in Christian like and decent manner at the discretion of my Executors hereafter named and as touching such worldly Estate wherewith it hath pleased God of his Mercy to bestow on me in this life (all my just Debts being first paid) I Give Devise and Bequeath of the same in the following manner before that is to say

Imp. I Give and bequeath unto my Son George Washington three hundred Acres of Land lying and being on the West Side of the Nottoway Swamp below the branch running out of the said Swamp below John Bauvais Land and so up to a line of marks trees thence turning down the said Swamp again till it includes by Estimation three hundred Acres of Land to the same more or less the which three hundred Acres of Land I Give unto my said Son and to his heirs for ever I also Give unto my said Son George Washington one negro woman called Sabery and all the Stock and moveables he hath now in his Possession and one feather bed and boulder and rug and pare of blankets and the Labour of one negro man called Dick during his life and then to return to William Washington

Item I Give unto my Son Richard Washington and to his heirs for ever all that part of my Estate he hath now in his Possession which is his full Share of my Estate

Item I Give and bequeath unto my Son John Washington One hundred and fifty Acres of Land to the same more or less Beginning at a branch commonly known by the name of Lake field Branch at the head thereof lying on the back side of his own Land running up to the head of the old field branch the which parcel of Land I Give unto my said Son and to his heirs for ever and all the Stock and moveables he hath now in his Possession

Item I Give and bequeath unto my Son William Washington and to his heirs for ever Three hundred and fifty Acres of Land Beginning at the aforesaid Lake field branch and so down the said Nottoway Swamp near to the mouth of the Lightwood Swamp to complete the same I also Give him all the Stock and Moveables he hath now in his Possession one the said Land I also Give unto my said Son and two Negroes said and large the which two Negroes I Give unto my said Son William Washington and to his heirs

Item I Give and bequeath unto my Son Thomas Washington and to his heirs for ever this Land and Plantation wherein I now live Beginning one the Blackwater Swamp at the first bridge that goes over to the Wide River thence a straight line to the head of the Hog pen branch thence to the 1st end of the Dragon thence to the head of the Will branch so down the said branch to the Black Water so down the Black Water to the first Station but my said Son shall offer to sell Lease or Mortgage the said premises seven Years that then the next here shall come in and enjoy the said Land as if it had never been given him or in Case he should refuse any of the rest to have the same privilege with the Will and all the Houses now standing on the said Land I also Give unto my said Son one negro man called Robin and also one negro man called Mingo with a Driver the said Thomas Washington buys a negro girl between 12 and 20 years of age for Ann Washington and if not Anne Washington to have the said negro Mingo I also Give to my said Son four Cows and Calves one feather bed and boulder rug and blankets six powder dishes and one Iron pot and one Strong Waters still six leather Chairs one Crosscut saw to belong to the plantation and also my Pease Acres

Item I Give and bequeath to my Son James Washington One hundred and sixty five Acres of Land lying one the Blackwater Swamp to him and to his heirs for ever but if my said Son shall offer to sell Lease or Mortgage the said Land for above seven years that then the next here to have and enjoy the said Land as if it had never been given to my said Son James or in Case that he should refuse any of the rest of his brothers to have the same Liberty

Item I Give and bequeath unto my Son Arthur Washington all the remaining part of the Land lying down below Thomas Washingtons Land one Blackwater being by Estimation three hundred Acres to the same more or less the which parcel of Land I Give to my said Son and to his heirs for ever but if he shall offer to sell Lease or Mortgage any part of the said Land that then Thomas Washington is to have and enjoy the said Land to be Give unto my said Son two hundred Acres of Land bounded and lying between his brother George Washington and Faggy run the which parcel of Land I Give to him and his heirs for ever but if he offers to sell Lease or Mortgage any part of the said Land that then George Washington is to have and enjoy the said Land for ever I also Give to my said Son one feather bed & boulder and rug and pare of blankets six powder dishes six leather Chairs one table and one Chair and one Iron pot one long Gun four Cows and Calves and three negroes after his Mothers decease that is Harry Seney and Frank and also three Labour of one Negro called Tom which he is to receive at the age of seven by one Year which he is not to sell nor Let if he doth without the his brother William Washington to leave in the said negro and take him as his one I also Give him one Copt Cat

Item I Give and bequeath unto my Daughter Elizabeth Lanier two hundred Acres of Land lying one the West Side of the Mill branch that is the Land whereon she now live the said Land I Give to my said daughter and to her heirs for ever I also Give her and her heirs privilege to get any sort of Timber out of any part of the Swamp for the plantation I Give to my Son in Law Samuel Lanier two hundred Acres of Land lying in the Co of Wills County in the Sh. Side of the Faggy run bounding one the West Side of Faggy branch running up to Robert Bixes line the which parcel of Land I Give to my said Son in Law Samuel Lanier and to his heirs for ever

I Give to my Daughter Cassilla Washington one feather bed well furnished with five new and a pair of new
Covers and Calens three new, one new and one old, six new plates, six new plates, and one silver
woman called Grace and one negro boy called Peter to her and her heirs Lawfully begots and in Case she
should die without such heir then the negro to return to the above mentioned the said negro & their heirs
I Give to my Daughter Ann Washington one feather bed and furnished six new plates, six new plates, and
one new silver called two Cows, and Calens and three Sheep and a horse and Saddle Salso give my
said Daughter one negro boy called Jesse.

I Give to my Daughter Faitha Bracher three Sheep besides what she hath already in her possession,

I Give to my Daughter Mary Clark one negro girl called I shall but if my said Daughter should die without heirs
the negro to my Estate also give my said Daughter seven pounds in Cash and pounds in English Goods and one Mare
and Saddle which Mare they have now in possession.

Item,

I Give to my Grandson Thomas Lawier the first Child negro boy brings to be named by its mother one bold Year

I Give to my four Grandsons Arthur, Sampson, Richard and Samuel each of them a breeding Cow or y^e value thereof

I Give and bequeath unto my Grandson John Washington two hundred and fifty Acres of Land lying in the Isle
of White County at the mouth of Potomay Swamp the which parcel of Land give to my said Grandson and to
his heirs for ever but if my said Grandson die before he comes to the age of twenty one years then the said Land to

fall to George Washington and his heirs Give to Richard and Josiah Bracher each of them a breeding Cow

I Give unto my beloved wife Elizabeth Washington one feather bed and furniture and the use of another during her
life and the labour of three negroes Harry, Frank, and Jone during her natural life and the third part of my
plantation during her natural life and one new yoke and six new dishes, and what Cattle and household stuff

she hath an Necessary Occasion of and hope.

My Will is that the remaining part of my Estate be divided between my wife and Children that is George, John,
Thomas, William, James, John, Cassilla, and Ann Give unto my two Sons George and William all my wearing
Cloaths to be equally divided between them. I constitute make and Ordain my two Sons George and Thomas to be
Washington in sole and sole Executors of this my Last Will and Testament utterly revoking and making void
all Wills by me before made. In Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and Seal the day
and Year above written. I have my two Loving friends John Sumners and Howell Edmunds to see this my Will
performed.

himself and her and their heirs and assigns he doth give grant sell remise Release Release Transfer and Convey
unto the said William Drvo and to his heirs and assigns for ever he being already in full and peaceable possession
of the Premises hereafter mentioned by virtue of a Lease made by the said Thomas Shely unto the said William
Drvo bearing date the day before the date of these presents all that little Piece of Land situate in the Parish of St. Martin
Demand of the said Thomas Shely and Martha his wife of or to a certain Tract or parcel of Land containing
three hundred and forty five Acres of Land lying in Surry County beginning at a marked Oak at the head of Brook
Drvo Land decerned N. 210. E. 30. along with his line then N. 38. E. 40. along the said Brook line upon E. 114.
