I Give and bequeath unto my daughter Mary Stodge one Cow and Calf and two pewter dishes.

I Give and bequeath unto my daughter Elizabeth Murrell one Cow and Calf and two pewter dishes.

I Give and bequeath unto my well beloved Son Samuel Clark all my goods and Chattells moveables and immoveables with the plantation with every part and parcel thereof therunto belonging In consideration that the said Samuel Clark is to keep and maintain his said Mother that is Robert Clark's Lawfull wife and to keep her well in Cloaths and all things Necessary as long as she shall live and then the said Son Samuel Clark to possess and enjoy all and singular every part and parcel thereof to me now belonging and to pay all and receive all the Debts Due and Demands I Likewise appoint Constitute make and Ordain my Son Samuel Clark Sen^r Lawfull executor of this my Last Will and Testament and likewise to bury me with a Christian like buriall and to pay all funeral Charges As Witness my hand this 17 day of February 1723.

This Indenture made the tenth day of March in the year of our Lord One Thousand Seven hundred and Twenty Three Between John Smith of Surry County Planter of the one part and William Francis of Surry County also said Planter of the other part Witnesseth That the said John Smith for and in Consideration of the Sum of five Shillings Current money of Virginia to him in hand well and truly paid by the said William Francis at and before the Signing and Delivery of these presents the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged hath bargained and sold and by these presents doth bargain and sell unto the said William Francis all that plantation tract or parcels of Land whereon the said John Smith now or lately lived Situate lying & being in the Parish of Southwark in the County of Surry aforesaid containing in the whole One hundred Acres, fifty Acres part whereof are bounded as followeth (to wit) Beginning at a gum Tree Standing near James Davis's Tobacco house so along a Parallel line marked to a white Oak Standing in the head of a Bottom To Drive the said bottom to the Branch so down the Branch into Poplar Swamp To up the said Swamp to a white Oak and along a line forty three pole to the gum begin at which said fifty Acres of Land were for the Consideration
