My body I bequeath to the dust from whence it came to be decently buried by my Ex: & hereafter named.
Item: As to what Estate ips: hath bequeath me with I give & bequeath to my son Ind & the heirs of his body Lawfully
begotten for ever the plantation where he now lives (that is to say) beginning at a white Oak in a line between
W: Thompson & my self by the path as you go from my Son Joans to William Surt thence South to the College
Line, down a long that Line to the Cart path, a long the Cart path to c W: Thompson's Line & mine so as
long that Line to the first Nation. but if my son John should dye without heirs Lawfully begotten my
desire is that it should descend to my son William & his heirs Lawfully begotten for ever.
Item: I give my son William & the heirs of his body Lawfully begotten for ever the land between the Land above
given to my son Ind & the round Island swamp as far in the woods as the Cart path & if he should dye without
such heirs I give it to my son Benj: & his heirs Lawfully begotten.
Item: I give my son Benjamin all the rest of that tract of Land & to the heirs of his body Lawfully begotten for ever.
Item: I give my son c Nathaniell after my wifes death the plantation where I now live & to the Heirs of his body
Lawfully begotten for ever.
Item: I give to my Son John Edwards the plantation where he now lives & to the heirs of his body Lawfully
begotten but if the said Thomas should dye without such heirs of his body I give it to my Daughter
Sarah & her heirs for ever.
Item: I give my Son William Edwards the north End of the Land lying on the west side of the round Island
Swamps according to the bounds given to him by his father & to the heirs of his body Lawfully begotten &
in case of failure of such heirs of his body I give it to my Daughter Mary & her heirs for ever.
Item: I give my Son John Edwards the remainder of the land lying on the west side of the round Island Swamps & to the
heirs of his body Lawfully begotten for ever but if he should depart this life without such heirs of
his body I give it to my Daughter Mary & her heirs for ever.
Item: I give my negro Called great Jack after my wifes death to my son John.
I give my negro Called Little Jack to my son William.
I give my negro Doll after my wifes death to my son Benj: & two young Cows & Calves when he comes of
age.
Item: I give my negro Cuffy after my wifes death to my son c Nathaniell & two young Cows & Calves when he
comes of age.
Item: I give my negro Amey after my wifes death to my Daughter Mary.
Item: I give my Daughter Sarah a feather bed & furniture.
I give my Daughter Ann Twenty Shillings to buy her a rug.
All the rest of my personall Estate of what kind or Quality soever I give & bequeath to my well beloved wife
Ann her heirs & assigns for ever hereby Constituting & making her my said dear wife Ann the whole and
Sole Executrix of this my last Will & Testament during my said Estate may not come to an appraisement

This Indenture made the 20th of April in the Eleventh year of the Reign of our Sovereign Lady Queen Anne & in the Year of our Lord God one thousand seven hundred & thirteen Between Robert Webb & Ann his wife of Southwark parish in the County of Surry of the one part & Gregory Rawlings of the parish & County aforesaid of the other part. Witneseth that the said Robert Webb & Ann his wife for & in consideration of the sum of one Shilling to him in hand paid by the said Gregory Rawlings the receipt whereof he doth hereby acknowledge himself to be therewith fully satisfied Contented & paid & by these presents Doth quit & Discharge the said Gregory Rawlings his heirs & Administrators he hath Demised Bargained Lett Leased & to farm to him & by these presents Both Demise Bargain Lett Lease & to farm Lett unto the said Gregory Rawlings his heirs & Assigns all that Plantation or parcell of Land: Situate Lying & being in the parish & County aforesaid & bounded as followeth Beginning at a white Oak in Richard Washingtons Line thence North North East one hundred & Sixty pole to a Stake then East south East three hundred & Twenty pole to a black Oak then South South West one hundred fifty pole then West north West Twenty three pole to a market pine said Washingtons corner thence to the first station including by estimation three hundred & fourty Acres by the same more or less together with all houses Orchards gardens woods ways Waters water Courses & all other Profits & Advantages to the same belonging or in any wise Appertaining to have & to hold the said Demised premises & every part thereof unto the said Gregory Rawling for & during the full term & times of three years fully to be compleated & ended yeilding and paying for the same yearly on the tenth Day of December the fee rent of one year of Indian corn if the same shall be lawfully demanded unto the said Robert Webb his heirs & to the intent & purpose that by Virtue of these presents & of the Statute for Transferring uses into possession the said Gregory Rawlings may be in Actual & Possession of the heretofore granted premises & hereby may the better be enabled to accept of a Grant & Conveyance of the Reversion or Inheritance thereof to him & to his heirs for ever.
