And after my just debts and Legacies be paid I Give and Devise the Residue and Remainder of my Estate to my loving Brother Beccall Tomlinson, to him and his Heirs forever. I have Constituted and appointed my two Brethren William Tomlinson and James Tomlinson my whole and sole Executors of this my last Will and Testament in WITNESSE whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed my Seal this Twenty fourth day of April One Thousand and seven Hundred and fifty Nine.
