Man named *Esper* and one Negro Woman named *Nelvey* two feathered Beds and their furniture and the use of my Plantation that I now live on during her Life.

I then Give and Bequeath unto my Son *Thomas Latham* his Heirs and Assigns forever one Negro Boy named *Joe*, one Negro Girl named *Tab*, one Negro Woman named *Nan* and her Increase, and all my Land lying in *Sussex County* likewise the above devised Negroes *Esper* and *Nelvey* after his Mother's decease.

I then Give and bequeath unto my Son *John Latham* his Heirs and Assigns forever one Negro Man named *Bristol*, one Negro girl named *Sunny*, and one Negro Boy named *Neeling*, and all my Land lying in *Demerarie* likewise the above devised Negro man *Dick* after the Decease of my Dear and loving Wife.

I then Give unto my loving Wife *Ann* and Son *Thomas Latham* my Stock of Cattle upon the Plantation where I now live to be equally divided between them, and after her decease wholly and solely to my Son *Thomas Latham*.

I then Give and bequeath unto my loving Wife and my two Sons *Thomas Latham* and *John Latham* all the rest and residue of my Estate both of what kind or Quality whatsoever except my Mill and Whipsaw which I leave to the use of my two Sons to be equally divided between them and Desire that they my Wife and two Sons make the division without any disturbance and I constitute and appoint my loving Wife *Ann* and my two Sons *Thomas* and *John Latham* Sole Executors of this my last Will and Testament and my desire is that my said Executors shall not be compelled to give security for their faithful Administration and Executors here nor no Appraisement nor Inventory to be taken of this my last Will and Testament. In Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this fifteenth Day of December in the Year of our Lord One thousand seven hundred fifty six.

Inprimis I give and Devise to my Loving Wife Martha Banks during her Widowhood the manner Plantation a Negro Wench named Tilly during her life or Widowhood, and when she Marries or Dies then to return to — my Son ^{James} Banks, and also the third part of my Stock as my Father Joseph and Hoge and one Bed and furniture, and provide age of the mill for Bread Corn.

Inprimis I give and Devise to my Son Burrell Banks the Water Mill and Negro Boy called Elia likewise my Dark Bay Horse Saddle Housing and Bridle one Bed and furniture my Gun and powder pole and Holes and Cullack and all the remaining part of my Stock from which I have left my Wife and such as I shall hereafter mention for my Daughter my Devise is that my Son Burrell shall have of what kind soever to him and to his Heirs Lawfully begotten of his Body forever.

Inprimis I give and Devise to my Daughter Susanora Banks one Negro Woman named Phillis one Bed and furniture my Bay Mare and Colt saddle and Bridle two Cows and Calves four new Dishes and half Dozen Plates one Iron Pot and the rest And my Devise is that if my Son or Daughter Dies without Heirs Lawfully begotten of their Body then their part to return to their Survivors.

Inprimis Lastly I constitute and appoint my Son Burrell Banks to be Executor of this my last Will and Testament. In Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and sealed the same with my Seal this fifth Day of March 1708.
