

July Court MDCCXXI

In the name of God Amen the 18th Day of December 1708.
 I Nathaniel Malone of Sussex County being sick and weak, but of
 sound and perfect Memory, and knowing that is appointed for all
 Men once to Die, I do make this my last Will and Testament. And first
 of all I give my Soul to God, and to Jesus Christ my Saviour, hoping
 for Everlasting Happiness in the Kingdom of Heaven, & my Body to the
 Earth to be Buried in a Christian manner, and as for my worldly Estate
 my just debts being first paid, I give (Devise & Dispose of as in form and
 manner following, that is to say.

Imprimis I give unto my Son Thomas Malone and to his Heirs forever all my
 Land which I now hold on the Southern side of Sappony Creek it being by
 Estimation three Hundred Acres more or less and the Premises thereon
 with the whole and sole Benefit of one half of the Mill, that is to say, the
 same to be in his quiet Possession at the Death of my dearly beloved Wife
 Christian Malone, then and not till then but if my said Son Thomas Dies
 without issue of his Body before the Death of my beloved Wife aforesaid then
 the said Tract of Land with the Premises to be equally divided between my
 two Sons namely John & Nathaniel and ^{their} joint Heirs forever.

Item My Will and pleasure is that my Negro girl named Peggy remains unto my
 Daughter Christian Malone, and her Heirs, that is to say, provided she be
 surviving at the Division which shall & may be at or after the Death of her
 Mother above named.

Item My Will and pleasure further is that my whole Estate lies and remains as
 in form and manner it now doth with the labour of all my Slaves until my
 Debts be discharged, that is to say, provided my Sons surviving shall as in
 form and manner heretofore aforesaid equally to discharge the said Debts aforesaid.
 But if my Sons or any of them do refuse equally to assist in discharging
 the Debts, then my whole Estate after the Death of my said Wife, and the
 Debts duly Discharged to be and remain Equally between my Daughter
 Christian aforesaid and those ^{her or} my Sons that shall by their care and Labour
 of themselves and Slaves aforesaid discharge the same.

Lastly I appoint my Son John Malone to be Executor wholly and solely of this my
 last Will and Testament. In Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand
 and Seal this 18th Day of December 1708. as is at first mentioned.
