I Item I lend unto my beloved wife Milley four negroes namely Phillis, Hannah, Frank and Jone during her natural life or widowhood, and when my said wife dies or marries then my will and pleasure further is that the four negroes aforesaid shall be set out at the discretion of Hinchia Williams and my brother in law William Malone for the benefit of my six youngest Children that are now alive, and if either dies then the same for the benefit of the said surviving of them.

I Item I set my son Burrell to be fully for himself the first day of October next ensuing from the date of these presents.

I Item my will and pleasure further is that my son John shall be under the Jurisdiction of Churchwardens untill he my said son shall arrive to the age of twenty years, provided he the said Churchwardens will give him forty Shillings in Schooling.

I Item my will and pleasure further is that the rest of my whole estate be for the use of my wife during her widowhood and then at the discretion of my Executors to be equally divided between my six youngest Children or as many of them as are alive.

I Item I appoint my brother in law Hinchia Williams and my brother in law William Malone to be executors of this my last will and testament. In Witness whereof I have set my hand and Seal this day and date above written.

I Bernal Tomlinson of the Parish of Abbeville and County of Sussex being Sick in body but of perfect mind and memory thanks be to Almighty God for the same, I do make and Ordain this my last will and Testament, that is to say, first I give & commend my Soul into the hands of Almighty God that gave it, and my body to the Earth to be buried in a decent Christianlike manner at the discretion of my Executors whom I shall hereafter mention, and as for such worldly estates as it hath pleased God of his infinite goodness to bless me with in this life I give and bequeath in manner and form as followeth.

I give to my brother John Tomlinson twenty pounds Cash, one horse and Saddle one feather bed, and furniture and half a dozen rush bottom chairs a case of bottles & one Cow and Calf.

I give to my sister Sarah Partridge half a dozen leather bottom chairs.

I give to Francis Weaver my short gun.

I give all my wearing apparel to William Tomlinson Son of Thomas Tomlinson.

I do leave my Land & Plantations and all the residue of my Estate to be sold by my Executors to the highest bidder for money, and the money arising from the Sale after my lawful debts & funeral Charges paid to be equally divided between my Sisters Sarah Partridge, Mary Renn & Ann Weaver.
