At a Court held for Sussex County the 19 Day of May 1762

The last Will and Testament of Joshua Pennington deceased was presented into Court by Marcus Pennington and Maddison Johnson the Executors therein named who made oath that as the law directs the same was proved by the oaths of John Pennington Sally Pennington and William Andrews the witnesses thereto and by the Court Ordered to be Recorded and on the motion of the said Executors a certificate is granted them for obtaining a probate thereof in due form

In the name of God Amen the 6 day of April 1768. William Parker of the County of Sussex of Parish of Ullmarch being sick and weak in body but of perfect mind and memory Thanks be to God for the same therefore calling to mind the mortality of my body and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die Do make and ordain this my last Will and Testament, that is to say, principally and first of all I recommend my soul into the hands of almighty God that gave it, and my Body I recommend to the Earth to be buried in a decent Christian Burial at the discretion of my Executors without doubting but at the General resurrection I shall receive the same again by the Mighty power of God, and as touching such worldly Estate as hath pleased God to bless me with in this life I Give Bequeath and assigne in manner and form following
I Give and bequeath to my son William Parker the Plantation whereon I now live with all the Land lying of the lower side of a new Chopt Line Running from Audimbram
