Therefore I do hereby make constitute and ordain this my last will and Testament, and desire it may be read by all as such. I give and bequeath to my loving Son John Whitehead, or to his heirs or Assigns forever, the manner Plantation, being part of the old tract of 100 Acres, which is fifty Acres, also one feather bed &c.

I give and bequeath to my loving daughter Elizabeth Whitehead one feather bed &c.

I give and bequeath to my loving daughter, Amy Whitehead one feather bed &c.
