sense and memory, do make and ordain this my last will and Testament, and first of all
I bequeath my Soul unto God hoping at the general Resurrection to have, that reunited to my
body and with both to enter into eternal happiness purchased by my dear Redeemer Jesus Christ
my body I desire may be buried in a Christian like manner according to the direction of my
Executors here after mentioned, and as touching what worldly goods it hath pleased Almighty
God to bestow upon me I them dispose of in manner and to persons following.

I first Give and bequeath unto my loving and beloved wife Ann the use of my Sand and Plantation during her natural life or widowhood, and then to my Son Nicholas Partridge to him his heirs and assigns forever.

Also I give and bequeath unto my loving and beloved wife Ann the use of the labour of my negro man called Sam^l till my son Nicholas Partridge arrives to the age of twenty years of age and then to him and his heirs forever. —

Also I give and bequeath to my loving and beloved wife Ann the use of one feather bed furniture
three bowls and baloon, one horse saddle and bridle one chest three pewter plates, one dish one
bason six spoons and the first child that brings till my son Nicholas Partridge arrives to the
age of twenty years of age, and then to him and his heirs forever.

Also I give unto my loving and beloved wife Ann the use of the labour of an negro woman called Ratt
 being my daughter Mary Partridge arrives to the of Eighteen years, then the said negro
 to her and her heirs forever.

1760 I give and bequeath unto my loving and beloved wife Ann the use of one feather bed & furniture
to my daughter Mary Partridge arrives the age of eighteen years of age and then the said
bed to her. —————

Also I give and bequeath to my loving and beloved wife Ann the use of the labour of a negro girl called Dido till my daughter Liberty Partridge arrives to the age of eighteen years of age and then the said negro to her and her heirs forever.

Also I give and bequeath unto my daughter Charity Partridge five pounds current money of Virginia to be paid unto her when she arrives to the age of eighteen years. —

Also I give and bequeath to my loving and beloved wife Ann the use of all the rest of my estate not heretofore disposed of during her natural life or her widowhood, or till my daughter Bramble-Lairdridge arrives to the age of eighteen years of age, and then to her and her heirs forever.

I do hereby appoint and constitute my loving wife Ann Bartrigge and John Adkins Executors of this my last will and testament hereby revoking and making void all wills and testaments by me formerly made. In Witnes whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed my seal this fifteenth day of January, in the year of grace one thousand seven hundred and sixty five.
