I William To whom of the Parish of Albemarle in the County of Supar being Sick & of sound & disposing mind & Memory thanks be to almighty God for the same. And Calling to mind the Certainty of Death & the uncertainty of this Transitory life Do make Constitutions herein this my last Will & Testament in manner following that is to say. First I commend my soul into the hands of Almighty God who gave it me. and as for my body I commend it to the Earth to be decently buried at the discretion of my Executors

Executor hereafter named. And as for my worldly Goods whereunto it hath pleased
God to bless me with I Give & Devise of as follows.

I Give & Devise unto my Loving Wife Katherin McLear during her natural life
the plantation whereon I now live with one hundred seven and a half acres of
Land thereunto belonging to be laid off in the lower part of my Land. I also
lend unto my loving Wife during her natural life or upwards the following
Slaves to wit / ^{his} Will. Carter & also the half of my Stocks of Cattle Hogs & sheep.
Also my mare Beauty & my Colt Dragon. Two bears & furniture the half of my
Clothes & Irons Brass & Steel side Saddle and Bridle. Also the half of my Indian-
born that shall be upon my plantation at my death. Provided it should so hap-
pen that I die before the first day of March next. but if I should survive that
day then my will & Devise is that my estate shall be kept together till the finish-
ing of the ensuing Crop & then my said Wife shall be entitled to the half of the
Gorn that shall be made as aforesaid, all which I lend unto my said Wife during
her natural life.

Item I Give & Devise unto my loving Daughter Anne Crowder, wife of Mark Crowder
two Negroes which she has now in possession to wit / Annary & Silia to her & her
heirs forever & also one feather bed & furniture.

Item I Give & Devise unto my Loving Grandson William Barclay Crowder & to his
heirs and assigns one Negro Girl namely Carter. but it is my will & Devise that
- my Daughter Anne Crowder shall have the use & Labour of the said Slave
during the marriage of her said son.

Item I Give and Devise unto my loving Grandson John Crowder yet unborn being
son of Mark Crowder & Anne his wife & to - his heirs & assigns one Negro Girl
namely Sue. but that my loving Daughter as to have the use & Labour of the
said Slave during the marriage of her said son.

Item I Give & Devise unto my Loving son Charles Barclay and to his Heirs & assigns
forever all my Lands in the County of Surry & for so much with the premises
thereunto belonging. I also Give my said son Charles Barclay the following
Slaves namely Harry & Lucy & c. Phillis Jones & Robin to him & his Heirs
forever. I also Give unto my said son Charles the Slaves with their Increase
which I have lent unto my Loving Wife and all the rest of the Estate I lent her
which my said son is to have after my ^{said} death. And I further Give & De-
vise unto my said son all the rest & residue of my Estate not heretofore
Given or bequeathed be it of what kind soever to him & his heirs forever.
My Will & Devise is that my estate ^{may not} be not Appraised.
