Arthur Blackburn his last Will & Testament bearing date the 1st July 1788 being in a last state of Body but of perfect mind and memory, calling to mind the mortality of Man, and knowing that it is appointed for all Men once to die, DO make and declare this my last will & Testament. And first I will recommend my soul to God who gave it, and my Body to the Disposal of my Friends to be buried in a decent Christian manner, And as touching such worldly estate as it hath pleased God to bestow, I dispose of in the following manner. — I will that my just Debts and several charges be first paid. — Then I leave to my sister Margaret the sum of £100 to purchase my largest plot and even creek and also three books viz. Millers's Commercial Law, a new twenty shilling, and my little plot in Len Hill. — I leave to my sister Martha the sum of £50 to purchase and three books viz. Robert's Cook in the Sea, my big book of Watts's Poems, and also silver spurs, three buckles, three books, and all my tools for her son William. — I leave to my sister Mary three books, pounds, and three books viz. The pilgrims progress the officers in prayer and the young mans servants let and also my little George. — I leave to Alexander Blackburn (John Blackburn's son) the sum of twenty pounds to help him in Learning. — I leave to Mother George's Daughter the sum of three pounds if she come to age, if not, let it come to William's share. — I leave to Brother William's share the sum of fifteen pounds to be divided among them when they come to age. — And lastly I will that my land be sold to the best advantage, and if the sell amount to more than what is mentioned let there be an equal addition made to every one according to their share, if not, let there be an equal deduction according to each of their shares. — I appoint John Blackburn of Washington County in my said John Berry of Lincoln County to be my Executors — And I will that these be done as my hand and seal this 1st day of July 1788.

Thomas M. Callough of the County of Virginia being in his full senses DO make this my last will and Testament. I give to my wife Rachel an equal part with my Children of my movable Estate and full possession of the same to have and to hold unto them and their heirs forever, and then to go to the use of my eldest son John. And I will that my other share lying in the North End of Albemarle to my second son Robert, and likewise give to my four Daughters Rachel, Mary, Sarah, and Elizabeth an equal portion of my movables, with my Wife and two sons, for support to live and my lawful Wife's part except one third part of the proportionable part of my land on equal part of my movables, to be given to my eldest son John, and also I leave to my wife and son John my whole Estate to be carried on Kentucky, and I appoint John and Sarah my whole Estate Executors. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 1st day of October 1780.

Advantage for the Child if it Lives & if not to be divided equally between
the Mother and Children Likewise I leave five Hundred Pounds to
Likewise I leave five Hundred to be Laid out for the Schooling & use of the Child
Born The Remainder I bequeath to my Wife to be at her Disposal. —
Lastly I do make and constitute for Executors James Trimball James
Berry & Thomas Berry I witness whereof I have hereunto Set my hand
and Seal this 19th Day of Feb^r in the Year of our Lord 1781
