Whereas William Campbell is proprietor of the lands on both sides of the Laurel fork in this County & is desirous to build a water grist Mill on the said land & to erect a dam across the said stream for working the said Mill. Therefore we command you to summon & impanel twelve fit Persons to meet upon the lands proposed for the abutment on the first day of next Month; which five hours shall be charged by you impartially & to the best of their skill & judgment to examine the lands above & below of the property of others which may be probably overflowed, and say to what damage it will be of to the several proprietors, whether the mansion house of any such proprietor, or the office, custilage or gardens thereunto immediately belonging or orchards will be overflowed; to enquire whether & in what degree fork of passage & ordinary navigation will be obstructed, whether by any and by what means such obstruction may be prevented & whether in their opinion the health of the neighbours will be annoyed by the stagnation of the waters, which inquest so made & sealed by the said jurors together with this writ you shall return to the next court to be holden for our said County of Washington.
