To all whom these Presents shall come or concern know
 ye that I John Hutton of the County of Washington being
 weak ^{and} infirm in health but of sound mind and ^{disposing} memory,
 and being desirous to settle my worldly affairs & dispose of
 the estate which a kind providence has blessed me
 with, and I accordingly give & bequeath as follows.

Impremus I give and bequeath unto my son Dickson
 Hutton and to his heirs forever all the land and real
 estate which I may die possessed of and all appurtenances
 thereunto belonging. I also give & bequeath to my said son
 Dickson all my Horses of every description except one mare
 called Juen - likewise all the Hogs, sheep and cattle of
 every description except one cow called the (flaked cow)
 I also give unto my said son Dickson all the Fodder
 Hay and grain that ~~may be on the plantation at my~~
 Death - it is also my desire that my said son shall have
 all the increase of the said excepted mare called Juen
 and the said excepted cow called the (flaked cow) to the
 use and benefit of him & his Heirs.

I likewise give and bequeath to my said son Dickson
 Hutton one Chest of drawers and one Bed with furniture
 and apparel complete.

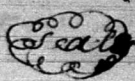
Item and as to the residue of my Estate - It is my desire
 that an Inventory shall be made of it after my decease
 and the same appraised by three disinterested men, and
 if it is the Choice of my said son Dickson to keep the
 said appraised property last mentioned at the valuation
 it is my wish for him to do so, and the amount thereof
 he is after the expiration of eighteen months to divide
 equally between my three daughters Ellenor, Ann and
 Margaret and to the children of my two deceased Daugh-
 ters Jane and Mary - that is to say one equal fifth
 part to each - and lastly it is my Will and desire that
 my said son Dickson and my good friend John Kim-
 iron shall become my Executors to this my last Will
 and Testament hereby revoking all former Wills and
 Codicils heretofore made or executed by me.

 ary in the year of our Lord 1808.

Jane & Mary the remainder of my apparel

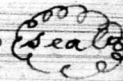

The last Will & Testament of John Hatton dec^d was
exhibited into Court proven by the oaths of Henry Dixon,
William Dickson & Edward Hatton the witnesses thereto And
a codicil thereto dated the 11th day of April 1808 was proven by
the oath of James Hatton a witness thereto and severally order
ed to be recorded. And at a Court held for said County the
21st day of June 1809 - On the motion of Dixon Hatton who
took the oath of an executor prescribed by law and entered
into & acknowledged his bond with John Cameron and
Henry Dixon his securities in the sum of five hun
dred dollars conditioned as the law directs a certificate
is therefore ^{granted} him for the probat of the said Will in
due forms.
