

Meditating on the uncertainty of human life I William King have thought proper to make and ordain this to be my last Will & Testament leaving and bequeathing my worldly estate in the manner following To wit.

To my beloved wife Mary in addition to her legal dower of all my estate the dwelling house and other buildings on lot number ten in Abingdon where I now reside together with the garden Orchard & that part of my Fruit hills plantation South of the great road & lands adjacent to Abingdon now rented to C Findlay & Co and at my fathers decease including those in his occupancy on the north side of the Great road for her natural life

I also will and declare that in case my beloved wife Mary hath hereafter a child or children by me that the said child or children is and are to be sole heirs of my whole estate real and personal. Excepting one third part of specified legacies and appropriations herein after mentioned. Which in case of my having children will reduce each legacy herein after mentioned to one third part of the amount hereafter specified & the disposition of the real estate. As hereafter mentioned in that case wholly void

In case of having no children I then leave & bequeath all my real estate at the death of my wife to William King son of my brother James King on condition of his marrying a daughter of William Trigg & my niece Rachel his wife lately Rachel Findlay. In trust for the eldest son or issue of said marriage, and in case such marriage should not take place I leave and bequeath said estate to any child giving preference to age of said William & Rachel Trigg that will marry a child of my brother James Kings or of sister Elizabeths wife to John Mitchell & to their issue

During the life time of my wife it is my intention and request that William Trigg James King & her do carry on my business in copartnership both Salt works and merchandizing each equal shares and that in consideration of the use of my Capital they pay out of the

same the following legacies

To John Mitchell on condition of his assisting & carrying on business them at the usual salary as formerly viz one thousand dollars per year for from two to five years as they may wish his assistance - an additional sum of ten thousand dollars payable five years after my decease & to each of his children upon coming of age one thousand dollars more than the General Legacy hereafter mentioned -

To Connally Findlay a like sum of ten thousand dollars payable in five years. To my Nieces Elizabeth Findlay & Elizabeth Mitchell (Being called for my Grand Mother with whom I was brought up) Ten thousand dollars in twelve months after marriage provided they are then eighteen years of age if not at the age of eighteen, to each of my other nephews and Nieces at the age of eighteen that is children of my brother James Sisters Nancy and Elizabeth one thousand dollars each - to each of the children of my half brother Samuel & half sister Hannah three hundred dollars each as aforesaid, to my said Sister Hannah in two years after my decease one thousand dollars & to my said half brother Samuel in case of personal application to the manager at Falkville or to my Executors in Abingdon on the first day of January annually during his life one hundred and fifty dollars, if not called for on said day to be paid for that year, and receipt to be personally given.

It is my wish and request that my wife William Trigg and James King or any two of them that shall concur in carrying on the business should either join all the young men that may reside with me and be assisting me on my decease that are worthy or furnish them with four or five thousand dollars worth of goods at a reasonable advance on a credit of from three to five years taking bonds with interest from one year after supply -

In case my brother James should prefer continuing Partnership with Charles S. Carson in place of John

the business of King Carson & King as soon as legal and convenient then my will is that William Trigg and my wife carry on the business one third of each for their own account and the remaining third to be equally divided between the children of my brother James & sisters Nancy & Elizabeth —

To my father Thomas King I leave during his life the house he now resides in & occupies at Fruit Hill together with that part of my land in said tract north of the great road that he chooses to farm with what fruit he may want from the Orchard the springhouse being intended for a wash house with the appurtenances subject to the direction of my beloved wife Mary as also the Orchard except as aforesaid I also leave and bequeath to my father the sum of two hundred dollars per annum during his life & if accidently fire should destroy his Pinecastle house and buildings a further sum of two hundred and twenty dollars per annum while his income there would cease —

I also leave and bequeath to the Abingdon Academy the sum of ten thousand dollars payable to the Trustees in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixteen or lands to that amount to be vested in said Academy with the interest or rents thereon forever Abingdon Virginia third March 1806.

The last Will and Testament of William King deceased was exhibited into Court and proven by the oath of William D Nielson one of the subscribing witnesses thereto, who further made oath that he saw John Doherty the other subscribing witness, sign his name thereto as a witness at the request of the said William King, that the said Doherty, of being resident in the Mississippi Territory about one thousand miles from this place, and that the said Will except the signatures of the witnesses is entirely in the hand writing of the said William King the Testator further that the codicil thereto appointing James King and William Trigg executors & dated the third day of March one thousand eight hundred and six is also in the hand writing of W^m King the Testator — that he believes the Codicil was written and lying under the Will when he attested it as a witness and that he never saw or knew of any other codicil — Col. James King Samuel Glenn & Jacob Baker made oath that the said Will & the Codicil dated the 3rd day of March 1806 are in the hand writing of the said William King the Testator except the attestation of the witnesses to the Will. The Court are of opinion that the said evidence is sufficient and it is ordered that the said Will and codicil be recorded — And on the motion of William Trigg & James King the Executors named in the said Codicil who took the oath of an executor prescribed by law & entered into and acknowledged their bond in the sum of one million five hundred thousand dollars with Robert Craig Jr, Thomas Tate, Robert Delap, John Aperson, Joseph Cole, Robert White, Bazil Sulbatt, John Cole, Thomas Moffett, Joshua Burke, William Duff, William Jones, Benjamin Estell, Samuel Vance, James Bryant, Michael Shaver, Gerrard Conn, James Thompson, Enoch Schoolfield, George Fannin, James Keys, John McCulloch, John Williamson, William Gray, James Lyon, Alexander Hamilton, Benjamin Longley, Jacob Mungle, Robert Hurston, Reuben Bradley, Valentine Baugh, John Mitchell, Jacob Baker

Mary King widow of William King dec^d. the following slaves to wit, Fin a mulatto man slave aged twenty eight years, Betty a negro woman aged forty five years, Daniel a negro boy aged eight years Alexander aged twenty two years, Samuel aged twenty four years James aged ten years, Polly aged sixteen years, Nelson aged eight years, Patty aged eight years, Rebecca aged six years & Aggy aged ten years being her share of the slaves whereof the said William King died possessed in his own right as produced to us. Given under our hands this 29th day of December in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred & eight.
