To all Christian People to whom these presents shall come greeting. whereas
the right Honorable Sir William Berkeley Lieutenant Governor Captain Genl of
the same and by Patten bearing date the second day of July 1669 Give and Grant unto
William Spence of the Parish of Cople in the County of Westmoreland Planter (since)
one hundred and 80 Acres of Land in Westmoreland County aforesaid upon the South East side
of a running river, beginning at a marked Cedar extending up the side of Nomony
R. 50 Poles to a marked white Oak standing at the head of a small Gutter
in marsh, from thence South East three hundred and Twenty Poles to a White Oak, which
line divides this Land and the Land of Richard Searles, from thence N.E. to another white
Oak from thence N.W. to the cedar begun at; the said Land formerly belonging to a
John Skinner, and by him sold to Richard ~~Searles~~ Searles, and then purchased by
one of Searles and found to escheat to his Majesty and granted to the said Skinner
the said Skinner and Elizabeth his Wife sold unto the said William Spence as
by a Conveyance dated the Second day of October 1665 may appear, To have and
to hold the said Land with his due share of all Mines and Minerals therein
contained, with all Rights and Privileges of Hunting, Hanting fishing & fowling, with
all Woods waters and rivers, with all profits, commodities and hereditaments to the
same, to the said Skinner his heirs and Assigns forever.
