present last will and testament, in manner and form following
that is to say. First, I commit my soul into the hands of all-
mighty God, hoping through the merits of Jesus Christ my sins
to have pardon and forgiveness for all my sins and my body
to be decently buried according to the direction of my Executors
hereafter named, and as concerning all such temporal Estate
as it hath pleased God to bestow upon me, I give and dispose of
as followeth, I will that all my just debts shall be paid and
discharged, all the rest and residue of my personal Estate
goods and chattels whatsoever I give unto my loving wife Ann
Webster and her heirs forever, whom I make whole & sole
Executors of this my last will and testament. I do revoke &
make void all other wills by me made heretofore either by writing
or otherways. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my

In the name of God Amen! I, John Gainer being sick and weak
of body, but at perfect memory and understanding do give and bequeath
my soul unto God that gave it, and my body to be decently interred. As
to my worldly Estate, I give and bequeath as followeth: Item I do give
and bequeath unto my well beloved son John Gainer and to his heirs for-
ever one moiety of Eight hundred and odd acres of Land, also I give
unto my well beloved son Henry Gainer, and to his heirs forever the other
moiety of the aforesaid Eight hundred and odd acres of Land to be equally
divided between my said sons John Gainer and Henry Gainer, the said
Eight hundred and odd acres of Land, being the Land my said sons
John Gainer and Henry Gainer are now seated upon. Item I give and
bequeath unto my well beloved son Henry Gainer my chest together
with my wearing apparel. Item I give and bequeath unto my well
beloved son Vincent Gainer and his heirs forever the whole plantation
and Land I am in on together with the Lands adjoining. Also I give
unto my said son Vincent and to his heirs a parcel of Land lying
in his point. Item I give and bequeath unto my said son Vincent
Gainer my long gun and my bow and a set of arrows. Also my will
