Westmoreland being very sick and weak in body, but of perfect memory, do
declare this to be my last will and testament in manner and form
following, first, I give and bequeath my soul to God almighty that gave
it me and my body to the earth whence came to be buried decently by
my Executrix hereafter named and as for such worldly goods as God of
his mercy hath lent me I give and bequeath as follows. Imp: I give
and bequeath to my well beloved wife Mrs. Temperance Blanchflower all my
estate in Virginia of what nature or kind soever as negroes, servants,
horses, mares, cattle &c and do make her whole and sole Executrix
of this my last will and testament. As witness my hand & seal
this first day of 8th 1694 / Benjamin Blanchflower

Signed, sealed, published and declared as the last will and testament
of Mr. Benja. Blanchflower in presence of us. Mich^l Wellington
Thomas Blount Junr.

of 8th 1701.
