In the Name of God Amen I Robert Hay of Charles Parish in York County being at this time very Sick and Weak in Body but of Perfect Mind and Memory therefore calling to Mind the Mortality of my Body and knowing that it is appointed for all Men once to dye do make this my last Will and Testament in manner and form following that is to say First I bequeath my Soul into the hands of Almighty God who gave it me trusting through the Merits Mediation and Intercession of my dear Redeemer Jesus Christ to find Salvation for the same and my Body I recommend to the Earth to be buried in decent Christian burial at the discretion of my Executor and I do hereby Constitute make and Ordain my wellbeloved Son John Hay to be my whole and sole Executor of this my last Will and Testament revoking and disallowing of any other Will heretofore made by me and as to what Worldly Estate God Almighty hath been pleased to bless me with I give as following meaning after my funeral Expences and just Debts are truly paid.

Item I give unto my wellbeloved Son John Hay all my Lands & Mesuages and Tenements formerly known to be Coverts to him and his Heirs lawfully begotten of his Body forever.

Item I give and bequeath unto my wellbeloved Son John Hay the best Bed that I am now possessed with with the furniture belonging to the same to him and his Heirs forever.

Item I give and bequeath unto my wellbeloved Daughter Dorothy Hay the next best Bed I now have to her and her Heirs forever.
