and he said Brown then told him that James Willson and his wife had
been very good to him and that if he died all that he had should be James
Willson's That the said Brown having no body to attend him was at his
own request removed to the said Willson's house the Saturday before he died
and the said Brown then Ordered Willson to send for all his furniture and
stock to his House which were brought accordingly and the said Willson
then desiring him to make a will he answered there was no occasion -
he the said Willson had every thing in his own Possession and there was no
body to call him to Account in case he the said Brown died and that every
thing he had was Willson's in case he the said Brown should die
