This is to Certify, That it appears from a List in this Office of such Officers  
and Soldiers of the Virginia Continental Line, during the Revolutionary War,  
as settled their Accounts, and received Certificates for the balance of their Full Pay,  
according to an Act of Assembly, passed the November Session, 1781, that a Certi-  
ficate issued on the 30<sup>th</sup> — day of April 1785, in the name of  
Alexander Harrison — as a soldier of infantry —  
for £36. 0. 0 which Certificate appears to have been delivered to Col<sup>o</sup> Clegg.  
<sup>30 There was another soldier in the same line whose certificate seems also to have</sup>  
<sup>been delivered to Col<sup>o</sup> Clegg. They may possibly have been the same person.</sup>

do upon my oath declare and testify; that, to the best of my knowledge and belief, the said Alexander Harrison did enlist in or about 1780 for the term of during the War

and served in the Regiment, No. 11 - in a Company commanded by Capt Thos Parker, under Maj John Poulson & under the command of Colonel (Unknown), which said Company of Infantry belonged to the Virginia Troops of the Continental line, and that he continued in the service until he died, just before the war ended, or upon his return home. I further declare that I have never received a warrant for the Bounty Land promised to said Alexander Harrison on the part of the United States; nor do I believe that he ever received it, or transferred his claim to it in any manner whatsoever. Therefore Know all Men by these Presents, That I Charles Booths aforesaid do hereby constitute and appoint VESPASIAN ELLIS, of Accomack County, Virginia, to be my true and lawful Attorney for me and in my name to demand and receive from the Secretary of War of the United States; a warrant for the quantity of land due to me as aforesaid; and my said attorney is hereby fully authorised and empowered to constitute and appoint one or more substitutes or attorneys under him for the special purposes above expressed. Witness my hand and seal this 13th day of September 1832.

Dear Madam:

Reference is made to your letter in which you request information in regard to Alexander Harrison, of Acquon County, Virginia.

The data which follows were obtained from the papers on file in the claim for bounty land based upon service of Alexander Harrison in the Revolutionary War.

Alexander Harrison, of Acquon County, Virginia, entered service in the Revolutionary War as a private in Captain Thomas Parker's company under Major John Rowles in the Virginia troops and his service of eighteen months terminated at the close of the war; he died on his way home from service, the exact date not shown.

The age of this soldier, the names of his parents, and the place of his birth were not given.

September 13, 1832, Charles Bowden, a resident of Acquon County, Virginia, applied for the bounty land which was due on account of service of Alexander Harrison in the Revolutionary War. He applied in behalf of himself, Fiddler Bowden and Scarborough Wilson, wife of James, the only heirs at law of the soldier. Bounty land warrant #1834 for one hundred acres of land was issued October 16, 1832. The relationship of these heirs at law to Alexander Harrison was not stated.

One Bowden named was present in Acquon County, Virginia, when Charles Bowden made application for bounty land in 1832; no relationship of Bowden named to the soldier's family was stated.

If you desire information in regard to the location of this land which was granted on account of service of Alexander Harrison in

the Revolutionary War, you should address the Commissioner, General Land Office, this city, and furnish the following data: Alexander Harrison, Warrant #182-100 acres of bounty land, issued October 15, 1833.
