Hayette County

on the 17th day of June 1818

before me the Subscriber, one of the Judges
of the Circuit Courts of the State, personally
appears George Peyton, aged sixty years, resident
in Woodford County, the said State, who being
by me first duly sworn, according to
law, doth on his oath, make the following
declaration in order to obtain the provision
made by the late act of congress
entitled "an act to provide for certain
persons engaged in the late naval service
of the U. S. in the revolutionary war."
That he the said Peyton was enlisted in
Bulfeffer County State of Virginia, in
the company commanded by Capt Thomas
Porter of the 10th Regt. of the U. S. Army
continued to serve in said corps in U. S.
from the month of March 1778 or 1779
until the month of May or June 1780 or
1781, being two years & some months, when
he was discharged from service in
Winchester, Virginia - That he was in
no

no battle of importance during his said
Service, being generally stationed as a guard
for prisoners - and that he is in reduced
circumstances - stands in need of the
assistance of his country for support; and
that he has no other evidence now in his
power of his said services that that
hereto annexed George Peyton
marks

Sworn to & declared before me, the
day & year aforesaid.

Benjamin Johnson Judge &c. as aforesaid
do certify that it appears to my satisfac-
tion, that the said George Peyton, did serve
in the Revolutionary war, & is in reduced
circumstances, as stated in the preceding
declaration. I now transmit the
preceding testimony taken & had before me
to the Secretary for the department of
war pursuant to the directions of

State of Kentucky Woodford Circuit
in September County 1821

To it remembered that heretofore
At a Court held for the September Circuit
Court at the Court house in Versailles on the
third day of September 1821. George Peyton
produced in open Court his schedule under
the act of Congress of the 18th day of March
1818 concerning Pensioners which is ordered to
be entered of record in the following words.

District of Kentucky Woodford Circuit
On this third day of September 1821 personally
appeared in open Court being a Court of Record
for the said District and Circuit of Woodford
County George Peyton aged 61 years resident
in Woodford County in said District who being
first duly sworn according to Law doth on his
oath declare that he served in the Revolution
"any way or place?" He enlisted under
Capt Thomas Pinder Culpeper County Virginia
in the 17th about a year as well as he recollects
before the siege of York to serve for
years in the 10 Virginia Regiment on Continent
tal establishment commanded by Col. Francis
Taylor was discharged somewhere after the siege
of York in Manchester Virginia by the same
Col. F. Taylor and I do solemnly swear
that I was a resident citizen of the United
States on the 18th day of March 1818.

and that I have not since that time by gift
sale or in any manner disposed of my prop-
erty or any part thereof with intent thereby
to diminish it as to bring myself within
the provisions of an act of Congress entitled an
act to provide for certain persons engaged
in the Land and Naval service of the
United States in the Revolutionary war passed
on the 18 day of March 1818 and that I
have not nor has any person in trust for me
any property or secured Contracts or debts
due to me ~~now or at any time~~ other
than that contained in the Schedule hereto
annexed (and) by me subscribed?

Two head of horses - which I have
bought with my pension money hereto-
fore drawn. worth \$70. Each to 4 head large
and small worth \$30. 4 head \$120
Douty \$1 farming utensils Plough, and
hoe \$12. Kitchen furniture \$6 = \$135
amount over \$135 - House furniture beside
and bed \$30 = \$155 - I am indebted
about nine shillings (and) have nothing
owing to me - my rent is two Barrels of
Corn per acre for 8 acres due next Chris-
-tmas which I must then pay - my oc-
-cupation is farming on rented land - I cannot
make any thing like I could when young
and in good health - my family consists of
my wife aged about 52 years my children

Children: are John aged twenty years Sally
aged 15 years Nancy aged 13 years and
Susan aged 11 years.

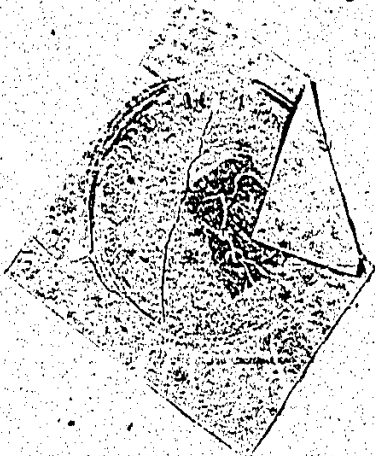

dred and fifty five Before me the undersigned
a Justice of the Peace in and for the county and
State aforesaid personally appeared Mary Jenkins
aged 60 years a resident of the County of Mercer and
State of Kentucky who being first duly sworn accor-
ding to Law doath on her oath make the following
declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the
provisions of the acts of Congress 7th June 1832 and
acts 1834-1838-1839-~~1840-1841~~ or under any other
act or acts of Congress to which she may be
entitled That she is the identical Mary Jenkins
one of the heirs and children of George Peyton Jr
who was a Revolutionary Soldier and a Pensioner
of the United States for services rendered in the
war of the Revolution in the Virginia Line
That her said Father was placed on the Kentucky
Pension Roll on the 21st day of September A.D. 1819
and drew his pension from the 1st of June A.D. 1818
Her said Father then resided in Woodford County
Kentucky and drew a pension at the rates of \$96
per year amounting in all to the sum of \$288⁰⁰
Her said Father was about the age of 71 years old
and he died in Woodford County Kentucky on the
Seventeenth/17th day of June one thousand Eight hundred
and thirty one 1831; That she does not know to what
Regiment or company her said Father served nor
does she know the length of time he served

she refers to the application of her said Father at the time he was placed on the Pension Rolls for the evidence of his said services which evidence is on file in the war department at the city of Washington that her said Father George Peyton Jr left a widow at the time of his death viz Susanna Peyton - {affiant's mother} who died in Woodford County Kentucky on the day of July one thousand eight hundred and forty one {1841} and that the following are the only surviving children of said George Peyton viz Mary Jenkins this affiant and Elizabeth Johnson ^{and others} Permanent of Woodford County Ky that her mother said Susanna Peyton was married to her father as she has been informed in the county of Culpeper and State of Virginia on the 15 day of April in the year seventeen hundred and ninety two {1792} by one Reuben John Leons and that the name of her mother before marriage was Susanna Lagell and that her Father said George Peyton died in Woodford County Kentucky on the 17th of June eighteen hundred and thirty one 1831 and that her Mother said Susanna Peyton died in Woodford County Kentucky on the date aforesaid She further says that she has never made application to the Government of the United for what was due to her for the arrears of pay due for the services of her said Father and that after the death of her said Father her said mother never made any application to be placed ^{on} the Pension Rolls and that her said mother never received the pension to which she would have been entitled had she made the application in

her life time she therefore makes application for what
her mother was entitled to had she made application
And she hereby appoints Benjamin H. Graves of the
City of Lexington Kentucky her true and lawful
attorney with power of substitution to prosecute her
claim and to receive a certificate for the amount
of pay due and coming to her when the same is
issued and to do all other and further acts that
may be necessary and proper in and about the premises
aforesaid by virtue of their presents Witness my

Pension at the rate of Ninety Six Dollars per annum
and during his life he drew a bounty the sum of \$2882⁶/₁₀₀
said Decedent was a man 71 years old and he died
in Woodford County Kentucky the 17 June A.D. 1837 - That
she does not know to what Regt - or Company or the
length of time her said Father served - That she has
no documentary evidence of her said Father's services -
She refers to the evidence of file in the war Depart-
ment in the application of her said Father to be
placed on the Pension Roll for the evidence of his
services which evidence is on file in the war department
at the City of Washington - That her said Father

George Peyton left a widow named Susanna Peyton who died in
woodford County Kentucky on the day of September ten and
and that the following were the only surviving
children of said Soldier viz - Elizabeth Solons and this
affiant and Mary Jenkins of the age of 63 a resident
of the county of Mercer Kentucky - that her mother said
Susanna Peyton ~~was~~ before marriage was Susanna
Bogell was married to her father said George Peyton
in the County of Culpeper and State of Virginia

Dear Sir:

The data given herein regarding George Peyton are found in the papers on file in pension claim, R. 8166, based upon his service in the Revolutionary War.

George Peyton enlisted in Culpeper County, Virginia, served as private in Captain Thomas Porter's company, Colonel Francis Taylor's Virginia regiment and was discharged at Winchester, Virginia, after the Siege of Yorktown, having served more than two years.

He was allowed pension on his application executed June 17, 1818, at which time he was a resident of Woodford County, Kentucky; he was then sixty years of age, the date and place of his birth not shown.

The soldier died June 17, 1831, in Woodford County, Kentucky.

George Peyton married April 15, 1792, in Culpeper County, Virginia, Susanna Cogell.

In 1821, the soldier's wife was about fifty-two years of age, and their children, John, Sally, Nancy, and Susan were aged twenty, fifteen, thirteen and eleven years respectively.

Susanna Peyton, the soldier's widow, died in July 1840 or 1841, or on September 25, 1840 (all dates are shown), in Woodford County, Kentucky.

In 1855, the only surviving children of George Peyton and his wife, Susanna, were shown as, (1) Mrs. Mary Jenkins, or Jinkins, aged sixty years and a resident of Mercer County, Kentucky, and (2) Mrs. Elizabeth

Johnson, aged fifty-nine years, and a resident of Woodford County,
Kentucky.
