Revolutionary Claims.

Under the act, entitled "An act for the relief of certain surviving Officers and Soldiers of the Army of the Revolution," approved 15th May, 1828.

TREASURY DEPARTMENT,

7 Feb. 1829.

SIR:

Your claim, under the abovementioned act, having been examined, you are found to be entitled to the pay of a Dragoon in the Continental Line. The amount which may be due, accordingly, will be remitted to you by the Treasurer of the United States.

I, James Ramsey, aged seventy five,
years, do, upon oath, testify and declare, that, in the year one thousand seven hundred and 75, I enlisted for the term of "during the war," and served in the regiment No. 1, under the command of Colonel Army, of the Dragoons, line; and that I continued in the service aforesaid until the close of the war, when I was regularly discharged from the

1st regiment, commanded by Colonel Army. I further declare, that I have never received a warrant for the Bounty Land promised to me on the part of the United States; nor have I ever assigned or transferred my claim in any manner whatsoever: therefore,

Know all men by these presents, that I, James Ramsey, aforesaid, do hereby constitute and appoint W. Joseph Wilson of Memphis City, to be my true and lawful attorney, for me and in my name to demand and receive from the Secretary of War of the United States, a warrant for the quantity of Land due to me as aforesaid; and my said attorney is hereby fully authorized and empowered to constitute and appoint one or more substitutes or attorneys under him, for the special purposes above expressed.

Declarant

In order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress passed June 4th 1832.
State of Tennessee S
Rutherford County 3.

On the 19th day of November personally appears in open Court, before the Circuit of Pleas and Quarter Sessions for said County and State now living James Bramley a resident of said County of Rutherford and State of Tennessee aged Eighty One years, who being just duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress passed June 4th 1832:

That he entered the service of the United States, in his earliest recollection, as well as he can now recollect, at the Spring of the year, then he does not recollect what year, declarant was drafted as one of the Militia in the County of Augusta, and rendezvous at Albemarle Bluff; where Col Campbell took the command of the detachment, and marched to Richmond, and from Richmond to Petersburg, and then to Hanes Bridge, and after encamping at these places sometime, the Corps was moved back to Richmond. At or near Beans Bridge there was a skirmish, and some of the Americans were killed; but declarant was not in the battle, he was in hearing - for declarant had been ordered to take care of the horses and baggage of Major Genl Hamilton, who just commanded the troops from Augusta - Declarant was in hearing of the guns - In this campaign declarant recollects an incident, that made a deep impression on his mind, it was the slaying of three men at Beans bridge belonging to the Illinois Line - under the charge of house breaking, and slaying the person found in it - Declarant was verbally discharged by Major Genl Hamilton after a service of three months and returned home - After remaining at home about one week, declarant joined the service of his country as a Substitute, in the place of Benjamin Smith, who was the son of Col Abraham Smith of Augusta County - Declarant rendezvous at Richmond, and was not placed under any Capt., for declarant was drafted by Col Benjamin Henry, who commanded the Corps to wait upon him. From Richmond was marched to the Bird Ordency afterwards known by the name of the Burnt Ordency - and was then marched back to Richmond, and after encamping there sometime was marched to Petersburg - and returned home with Col Harris who lives in Augusta County and was discharged - In this campaign declarant served three months. Upon this campaign, declarant believes that the British were encamped at Richmond, and he recollects, that the American Troops, encamped at the Burnt Ordency, frequently went down to the British lines and would fire upon the sentinels - and in some instances the British sentinels were killed - After remaining at home a week or so after his return from his second tour of duty, declarant volunteered his services under Capt George Houston, and Col Bird took command of the corps, and marched to into Rutherford County, the object of the march was to burn and destroy the houses - we were marched to the residence of John Cleppole, who was called the God of

the forces; and at Cypress house a fort by the name of Parker was constructed.
After serving his term of three months, the forces sent him away, and permitted
him to absent from further hostilities, declarant means a written discharge from
Capt Houston and he returned home - The year after this service
declarant enlisted as a regular soldier in the corps of dragoons commanded
by Col. Arnold - and remained in service during the war - Declarant
was born in Augusta County State of Virginia April 15th 1793; he has no mind
of his age; nor has he any documentary evidence in his possession to prove his
said services; nor does he know of any one now living by whom he can prove it.
Declarant means means for his services in the militia but an written discharge
and that was from Capt George Houston, which he has lost or misplaced -
After the war declarant remained in Virginia two or three years, and then moved
to West Carolina, and afterward to the Indian lands in South Carolina - and he
moved to North Carolina Burke County, and in the year 1812 moved to Rutherford
County State of Tennessee, where he has lived ever since and now lives - Declarant
is known in his neighborhood to Miss John Weston, Andrew McRae, Dan Peete,
Ezra Wright, Henry Goodlin, John L. Linton, David McRae, Norton McRae,
John McRae, Sam. McRae, Leron McRae, Henry Front, Tracy armie
Moore, and David Linton, all of whom declarant believes, would testify as to his age,
his veracity and their belief that declarant was a soldier of the revolution -

He hereby states that he now means a pension from the Government,
and has a his physician's certificate on file, under the Act of Congress
of 15th May 1838.
