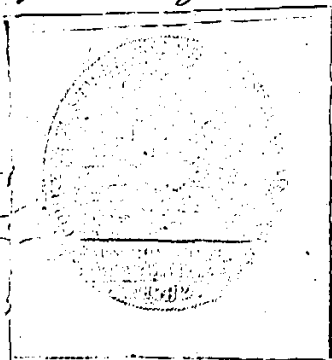
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In Richmond Hustings Court, January 14th 1845.

On the motion of Henry Northrup, it was satisfactorily shown to the court by certificates from the register of the Land office, that James Harrison of Culpepper County, a lieutenant of the Virginia line of the Army, fell in battle in October 1777, and that Richard Harrison was his heir at law. And by certificates of the probate court of the State of Mississippi, that Philip Barbour, Caroline Matilda, Mabella, Richard and Hay Battiel, were the children and only heirs at law of one Richard Harrison deceased. And that Philip B. Dougherty was the son and only heir of the said Caroline Matilda deceased. And it is ordered to be certified that Philip Barbour, Caroline Matilda, (deceased) Mabella, Richard, and Hay Battiel, are the nephews and nieces and heirs at law of the said James Harrison deceased, in right of their late father Richard Harrison deceased. And that Philip B. Dougherty is the son and only heir of the said Caroline Matilda deceased.

I hereby certify that Mr James Harrison of Culpeper county was the twenty third day of July 1776 appointed a lieutenant in my company of riflemen raised for col^o Hugh Stevenson's battalion which was afterwards annexed to col^o Morgan's reg^t of infantry in the Virginia line on continental establishment, & that the said Harrison continued in service untill the ninth day of October 1777 - at which time he was killed in an action near Saratoga Given under my hand this eighth day of February 1784

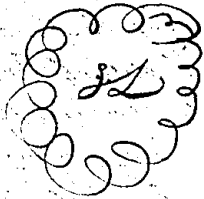
Know all men by these presents that I Philip B. Harrison one of the sons & heirs at law of Richard Harrison ^{Harrison} (late a Lieutenant of the Illinois Regt during the Revolutionary war) of Jefferson County Missⁱ appoint Wm Stodd of Frankfort Ky my atty in fact with power of substitution to receive from the war Dept at Washington City all balances of money due under the provisions of the act of Congress of the 5th of July 1832. as the half pay for life due me in virtue of said Richard Harrison's services as a Lt of the Va Militia during the Revolutionary war to receipt for all sums thus received. To receive from the United States a land warrant due in virtue of the services of Lieutenant James Harrison of the Virginia Continental line during the Revolutionary war who fell in battle in the cause of his Country in Oct 1777. To surrender said warrant to the Commissioner of the General Land Office at Washington & for the same purpose desc^t to sell the same To get all additional bounty due from Va in virtue of the services of said Richard or James Harrison desc^t & surrender the same to the Secretary of the Treasury of the United States & for the same purpose desc^t to sell the same, as witness my hand & seal this 10th day of April 1844

Harrison made oath that from information & belief his father Richard Harrison was the eldest brother and heir at law to James Harrison who fell in battle during the Revolutionary war while in command as a Lt of the Va Cont^l line that he only speaks from information as he always understood that his father got from Va 2666 ²/₃ acres of land from for said James Harrison's services said Harrison further states that no change in the heirship has taken place since the

Madam:

In response to your letter dated the 9th and received the 11th instant, you are advised that the Revolutionary War records of this Bureau fail to afford any information in regard to Benjamin, Daniel and Samuel Harrison who were killed during the Revolution, or in regard to their widows' families.

James Harrison of Culpeper County, Virginia, on July 23, 1776, was appointed Lieutenant in Captain Gabriel Long's company of riflemen which was raised for Colonel Hugh Stevenson's battalion and afterwards annexed to Colonel Morgan's 11th regiment of infantry. Said James Harrison was killed in action near Saratoga, on October 7, 1777. Bounty Land Warrant No. 2,355 for 200 acres was allowed on account of his services, to his neices and nephews, Philip Barbour, Mabella, Richard and Bay Battiel the children of his brother Richard Harrison, and to Philip B. Dougherty his grand nephew; his heirs at law.

It is not stated that the soldier had a wife or children.
