The Deposition of Philagathus Roberts
State of Virginia Culpeper County March #16 1839
This Dependant saith that he has known John Lampkin
and Mary Lampkin his Wife for the last forty five or
fifty years, that in 1794 and 1795 he managed an estate
for his Father on which was saw and Grist Mill that the
said John and Mary were frequently there and were very rich
They had at that time several children and lived together and
was called Man and Wife in 1802 or 1803 this Dependant,
Wife hired Joanna Lampkin in his family as a Spinner
(Daughter of Mary and John) she was then (from appearance)
about 14 or 15 years old. In the beginning of the year 1811
this Dependant contracted with John Lampkin and his
Wife Mary for the services of himself and his two sons
John, and Thomas to work upon his Farm they behaved
so much better than was anticipated from their idle hab-
its, that I made the Old Man an offer 1812 he then in-
formed me his son John would be of age 21 years old in
August and he doubted whether he would serve longer
I then spoke to young John who said he knew he was
of age that year but if his Father and I bargained he
would serve all the year, we bargained, and notwithstand-
ing his promise, he left my services in August and
has been his own man ever since. He is living in the Ne-
ighborhood near and says he is 48 years old. They had
two children older than John J. William and Joanna
William died when young Joanna is now living with her
Mother, who says she is 58 years old, and I should say from
her appearance she was at least that - They had four other
children younger than John all corresponding to make
William had he lived 52 or 53 years old at this time -
The old Man was a great Drunkard and spent every
thing he could get in Liqueor the hire of his children
was spent in that way which kept them very poor, had
they not been married the children would have been less and

under her control and out his, neither would they have
been bound for each others contracts, they were always dealt
with as Man and Wife, their little Estate was appraised
as his - They have lived on the Defendant's Estate ever
since 1810 three years excepted the We have more records in
it and has ever since the death of her husband which
was in July 1830 further this Defendant saith not -

To the Honorable Congress of the United States
Gentlemen of the Senate and House of Representatives

Washington D.C., 1836

Your petitioner, Mary Lambert was the wife of
John Lambert deceased who was a soldier in the revolutionary
war, he received his services and pay before they had
arrived Hugh Holmes Judge of the Superior Circuit Court
of the County of Culpeper and was placed on the pension
list of the United States in the year eighteen hundred and eight
teen and drew three semimonthly instalments of forty eight
dollars each, on eighteen hundred and twenty he received a notification
and disengagement he received a letter from the War Department
stating that he with some others was stricken off the pension
role namely (Peter Tinsley) (who enlisted at the same time
with him) for three years and was not on the pension list
at the same time with him, the Peter suspect has been
reinstated on the pension list and now in act of the last
Congress he has received his full compensation from the
time he was stricken off until reinstated on the pension list
Your petitioner thinks it not just that she should draw that
her husband might have done and would have drawn had
he not been improperly stricken off since the day of his death
which was by the 26th of 1830 making about 10 years. Your
petitioner would have a numerous family that are poor and
having all to support their own families not capable of paying
for any assistance, and would not for the benevolence of the mag-
istrate, or much she could have been sent to the County Jail
to spend the remainder of her days notwithstanding her just claims
on the government whose Treasury is full to overflowing.

On this 7th day of April 1816 before me the Subscriber
one of the Judges of the General Court of the State of Virginia
personally appeared John Lambkin aged 79 - Years Resident
in the County of Loudoun in the State of Virginia who being
by me first duly sworn pending to him - took on his oath
make the following declarations in order to obtain the
provision made by the late act of Congress entitled an act
to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and Naval
service of the United States in the Revolutionary War - that the
said John Lambkin entered in the Year 1776 in the Company
commanded by Capt Gabriel Louis of the said State which Company
part of the first Virginia State Regiment that he continued to serve
in the said Corps and in the service of the United States until
the fall 1779 when he was discharged from service in the State of
Virginia and that he was on the Battle of Monmouth
and that he is in reduced circumstances and stands in need of
the assistance of his Country for support and that he has no other
evidence of his service except the enclosed Certificate just
returned to and declared before me the day and Year aforesaid

William Brubaker made oath before me a Justice
of Peace for said County that he was a Lieutenant in the first
Virginia State Regt that the said Regt marched from this State
and joined the main Army of the United States in the State
of New Jersey in the fall of the Year 1777 - in which service
it continued until the latter end of the Year 1779 and
that he recollects that John Lambkin was a Soldier in the
said Regt during the said service - sworn before me by and of April 1816

Dear Madam:

Reference is made to your letter in which you request the Revolutionary War record of Elias, Turner, and Sherwood Fort, of North Carolina and John Lamkin, a pensioner of Culpeper County, Virginia.

Because of the great demand for Revolutionary War data and the limited trained clerical force available for furnishing such data, it is not possible to comply with your request in full.

You are furnished herein data obtained from papers on file in the Revolutionary War claim for pension W. 8018, based upon the military service of John Lamkin in that war.

The date and place of birth and names of parents of John Lamkin are not shown.

John Lamkin (the name also appears as Lampkin and Lambkin) served under Colonel John Field at the battle of the Kanawha River; during the Revolution, he was in the militia and in the marine service, no details given; he enlisted sometime in 1776, exact date not given, served as private in Captain Gabriel Jones' company, Colonel George Gibson's Virginia regiment, was in the battle of Monmouth, and was discharged in the fall of 1779; he again enlisted, marched to Yorktown, was at the surrender of Cornwallis and guarded prisoners to Winchester, dates and officers' names not given.

The soldier was allowed pension on his application executed April 7, 1818, at which time he was aged seventy-nine years and resided in Culpeper County, Virginia.

John Lanekin died July 20 or 27, 1830.

Soldier married February 10, 1786, Mary Lee, a widow, whose maiden name was Mary Story. They were married by Parson Craig of Fauquier County, Virginia.

John Lanekin's widow, Mary, was allowed pension on her application executed November 20, 1838, at which time she was aged seventy-six years and resided in Culpeper County, Virginia. In 1845, her post office address was Wheatley, Fauquier County, Virginia.

Eight children ^{shown} and referred to; the only names ^{shown} given are William, who died when young; Joanna, who was living with her mother in 1839, and was then aged about fifty years; John, born in August, 1791, and was living in Culpeper County, Virginia, in 1839, and Thomas Lanekin.

In order to obtain the date of last payment of pension, the name and address of person paid and possibly the date of death of Mary Lanekin, widow of John Lanekin, W.8018, you should address the Comptroller General, General Accounting Office, Records Division, this city, and cite the following data:
