On the 14<sup>th</sup> day of  
September 1838 personally appeared before B. S.  
Newland a Justice of the peace in and for Shelby  
County Kentucky Theodicea Holland a resident  
of Kentucky in the county of Shelby aged Seventy  
two years who being first duly sworn according  
to law doth on her oath make the following declaration  
in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made  
by the act of Congress passed July 7<sup>th</sup> 1838  
entitled to An act granting half pay and  
pensions to certain widows

That she is the  
widow of Jonas M. Holland who was a  
prisoner of the United States under the act  
of Congress of June 7<sup>th</sup> 1832 that he drew a  
pension of thirty seven dollars or there abouts  
under said act but she will not undertake to  
state the particulars of the service nor the precise  
amount she will refer the department to the  
declaration of her husband the said Jonas M.  
Holland made under the act of Congress  
of 7<sup>th</sup> June 1832 She further declares that  
she was married to the said Jonas M. Holland  
on the day of December in the year Seventeen

hundred and eighty three in Cumberland county  
State of Virginia that her husband the aforesaid  
Jonas M. Holland died on the 29 day of Sep-  
tember 1835 that she was not married to him Sept

prior to his leaving the service but the  
marriage took place previous to the first  
of January Ainteen hundred and ninety  
four viz at the time above stated

The declarant will further state that she  
has no family records of her marriage

that she has a record of the ages of her  
children which is herewith filed and  
that she believes the record is correct  
that she was married about the close of  
the revolutionary war that her eldest daughter  
was born in the year Seventeen hundred  
and eighty four. She will further  
state and declare that she is unable to  
attend in open court to make her decla-  
-rations that her health is so bad that  
it would be almost impossible for her  
to go in a carriage or any other mode of  
conveyance

Declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June the 7<sup>th</sup> 1832.

State of Kentucky County of Shelby - On this 18<sup>th</sup> day of August 1832 personally appeared (before me J. C. Burnett) a Justice of the Peace in & for the County of Shelby, James M. Hollister a Resident of the County of Shelby, State of Kentucky, aged 38 years who being first duly sworn according to Law. doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June the 7<sup>th</sup> (1832) that entered the service (being drafted) of the United States Militia (being drafted) under Captain Charles Balce and Union Balce being Lieut. and John Kowel Ensign and Major Stuffed was his Major he started from Cumberland County Virginia where he was born in the year 1856 he started in May before Fairbairn and marched to Hillsborough N. Carolina where he joined the main Army under Gen. Taylor there he marched and camped at Cedar River near Orange N. Carolina where he became sick & helpless with the Camp fever and was placed in the hospital where he lay helpless until after the Battle of Gath defeat. he served the term in the capacity of a Corporal and returned home to Cumberland County sometime that fall. he further states that he was drafted the 2<sup>nd</sup> time and entered the service of the United States in the month of March before the Battle at Guilford Courthouse under Gen. Robert Harrison and Captain Lieut. Ignorance Lawson and Colonel Hale and was field officer he started from Cumberland County Va and marched to Hillsborough N. Carolina and there joined the main Army a few days after the Battle at Guilford when he was sent by Gen. Lawson & Col. Hale to Prince Edward County Virginia with Patrick of ~~the~~ and he got home again sometime that Spring. he further states that he was drafted a third time in the Spring before Cumberland was taken on March again from Cumberland County Va and marched to Richmond Va and there drew arms and some head quarters at fall Creek Church under Gen. William M. W. General Stephen & Major Dealeman a friend of his was field officer and the Major General then <sup>the Army</sup> and marched <sup>there</sup> on to Blueburg Louisa County from there to the Ground Squirrel Church in where he got his discharge he served as a Sergeant this time

also had Holland further states that he was captured a fourth  
time in the ~~year~~ <sup>same</sup> September of the year and entered the service under  
Captain Richard Allen and Colonel Skippin was one of his  
field officers and he marched immediately to the siege of York and  
was there when Lord Cornwallis surrendered and served until  
the last business was finished that he faithfully served the four ~~years~~  
years of duty each three months except the last and when he was  
served discharged in consequence of the war being ended he has  
discharged ~~and~~ has long since lost or mistaid them &c

he hereby Relinquishes every claim whatever to Lord M. Holland  
a pension or annuity under the present and declares that his name is not  
on the Pension Roll or the agency of any State.

incapable to attend at any Court (either ex parte or to be) also I  
certify that I have been well acquainted with him for upwards  
of thirty years he has been residing near Norfolk and believed in  
the neighbourhood where he resided to have been a Soldier of the Revolu-  
tion and hence in that opinion I have also put the necessary  
Interrogatories to him &c Given under my hand & Sealed
