Lawrence Bonnar states on oath  
that in or about the year 1774  
he entered as a soldier under Capt.  
An buckle, to go on an expedition  
against the Shawanese Indians,  
for two years, and before said two  
years had expired he was listed as  
a soldier under Capt. Wallace, of  
the 8th Regiment, of the Virginia  
Continental States line; & the aforesaid  
Regiment was commanded by Col.  
Woods. He further states that he served  
the aforesaid three years under said  
Col. Woods in the revolutionary war  
& at the expiration of said 3 years  
he was honorably discharged by said  
Col. Woods; that he has lost his  
said discharge, and is unable to find  
it. He further states that he made

resides in Cumberland County  
State of Kentucky, is sixty five years  
of age, very infirm in body, and  
from his indigent circumstances  
in life needs the assistance of  
his Country for support.

Lawrence Conner, whose name is sub-  
scribed to the foregoing statement, this day ap-  
peared before me Christopher Tompkins one of  
the Circuit Judges for the state aforesaid, & sole  
Judge of the Cumberland Circuit Court, & made  
oath, that the matters & things alleged & set forth  
in the said statement are true. Given under my  
hand this 14<sup>th</sup> Sept. 1818.

I do further Certify, that it was this day proved  
before me by the oath of Samuel Stockton, that  
the above named Lawrence Conner is in law &

District of Kentucky. Cumberland County, 1st.

On this 12 day of October 1820 personally  
appeared before us, E. Dugherly W. S. Frazar  
& L. S. Frazar being three Justices of the Peace in  
& for the county of Cumberland Kentucky (it  
being the number required by law to hold a Court  
called the County Court of Cumberland County &  
which said Court is a Court of Record created by  
Statute & which said Court in its proceedings is  
governed by the Rules of the common Pleas of  
Lawrence Conner, at his own house in the said  
County. The being as cripple, weak & emaciated  
by the wounds received in the Revolutionary  
War, and in consequence of such debility unable  
to attend at the Court house in the County of  
Cumberland where the said Court is usually  
held. Aged 67 years resident in the  
District and County aforesaid, who being first  
duly sworn according to Law doth on his  
Oath declare that he served in the Revolutionary  
War as follows served under Col Woods 3/12  
years Regt for three years Capt Andrew  
Wallace same time Col Campbell  
2 Regt Capt Jewett 18 months and was in  
5 battles as follows the first  
in Garmontown 2 Monmouth 3  
Gilford 4 Campdell where I was wounded  
5 at Stony point

And I do solemnly swear that I was a  
resident citizen of the United States on the  
18th day of March 1818 & that I have not since  
that time, by gift, sale or in any manner  
disposed of any property, or any part thereof  
with intent thereby so to diminish it as to  
bring myself within the provisions of the  
act of Congress Entitled "an act to provide for  
certain persons engaged in the land and  
naval service of the United States in the  
Revolutionary War passed on the 18th  
day of March 1818. And that I have not  
nor has any person in trust for me any  
property or securities, contracts or debts  
due to me: Nor have I any income other  
than what is contained in the Schedule hereto  
annexed & by me subscribed. Sworn to and  
declared before us the aforesaid justices of the  
peace this 12 day of October 1820

Dear Sir:

Reference is made to your request for the Revolutionary War record of Lawrence Connor, private with the Virginia troops.

The data furnished herein were obtained from papers on file in claim for pension, S. 35853, based upon service of Lawrence Connor in the War of the Revolution.

The date and place of birth of Lawrence Connor, and names of his parents are not given.

Lawrence Connor enlisted for two years, and served in Captain Arbuckle's Virginia company, in an expedition against the Shawnee Indians, before the expiration of the two years, he reenlisted for three years, served as private in Captain Andrew Wallace's company in Colonel Wood's Twelfth Virginia Regiment, and in Captain Jewet's company, and in Colonel Campbell's Virginia regiment; during the service he was in the battles of Germantown, Monmouth, Stony Point, Camden, where wounded, and in the battle of Guilford Court House

On account of disability resulting from wounds received in the Revolution, nature of wounds not stated, Lawrence Connor was pensioned from September 4, 1789, then living in Virginia. It was stated



that he was a resident of Botetourt County,  
Virginia at this time.

Lawrence Conner was allowed pension on  
account of his service in the Revolutionary War  
on his application executed September 14, 1818,  
at which time he was living in Cumberland County,  
Kentucky, aged sixty-five years.

Lawrence Conner in 1820 referred to his  
children- Ester Conner aged thirty years  
Cornelius Conner aged eighteen years  
Jinny Conner aged sixteen years  
Margret Conner aged thirteen years.

There are no data in regard to the wife of  
Lawrence Conner. He died March 17, 1828.

Reference was made in 1841 to Cornelius H.  
Conner, it is not shown that he was identical with  
the son, Cornelius Conner, referred to above.

The papers on file in this claim contain no  
further discernible family data.

The application for headstone for Lawrence  
Conner is returned herewith. There was no cor-  
respondence enclosed.
